"Peggy Sue Got Married" is supposed to be the big comeback film for Francis Ford Coppola. Apparently he's given up doing juvenile S.E. Hinton novels for adolescent minds and is returning to the mainstream. "Rumble Fish" and "The Outsiders" were box-office duds, but they had some sparks of creative film-making even if it was wasted on giggling girls only there to see Matt Dillon in tight blue jeans.

Now Coppola is back with a straightforward story told in a

straightforward way without odd camera effects and angles. "Peggy Sue Got Married" owes more to a strong script than Coppola's film making. Coppola's images are surprisingly real to appeal to mainstream tastes.

The story is about Peggy Sue (Kathleen Turner), who has separated from her husband, Crazy Charlie, the Appliance King who shows up on TV every day trying to sell appliances with obnoxious raving and ranting. Peggy Sue attends her Class Of '60 High School Reunion minus her estranged husband who left her for a younger woman. This kind of lacks plausibility for me. Who would leave Kathleen Turner?

Anyway, while accepting the Queen of the Reunion award, Peggy Sue passes out and wakes up to find herself at the Buchanan High blood drive where she had fainted donating blood. Peggy Sue is confused. In comes Charlie, her high school sweetheart, and gives her a kiss.

but it's a dream she starts to enjoy

and can't return from. She goes home with her friends and has a hilarious homecoming. The funniest parts of the film occur when the 40-year-old plus Peggy Sue has a touching reunion with her parents, hugging them as if she hadn't seen them in years. She goes out to the street and laughs at her dad for buying an Edsel, then goes back in the house to take some quick shots of bourbon from her father's liquor supply.

Later, Peggy Sue goes out with the confused 17-year-old Charlie, who doesn't understand why his high school sweetheart is suddenly blaming him for running around on her and ignoring their children. Peggy Sue uses '80s pop psychology on these innocent '50s characters with ease, creating humorous results.

Peggy Sue eventually decides to break up with Charlie and goes off for a night of love and squalor with Michael Fitzgerald, the handsome class beatnik. Peggy Sue knows the next day is her 18th birthday when she and Charlie got together and had an accident that resulted in their first kid. Will she change history and not marry Charlie?

Kathleen Turner is great as Peggy Sue. She certainly doesn't look 17 years old, but after a while, the audience can ignore that. Nicholas Cage as Charlie is kind of irritating. I begged Peggy Sue to break off with

This story is the worn-out plot of going back in time and living your life over. It's a mainstream story shot in a mainstream manner by Coppola. It's good fun and entertainment, so if that's what it takes for people to see Coppola films, how can I complain?
