Huskers vault Penn State to No. 1

For the first time since before a 19-0 loss to Arizona State on Sept. 21, 1996, the Nebraska football team moved to No. 1 in both The Associated Press Top 25 and the USA Today/ESPN coaches' poll Sunday.

But this time, NU senior quarterback Scott Frost said, the Cornhuskers earned it.

"Last year when we were No. 1 at the beginning of the season, it was handed to us," Frost said. "This year we went up and beat a good Washington team. We beat a good Kansas Stated team, and we beat some other teams that are really respectable."

Nebraska improved to 6-0 overall and 3-0 in the Big 12 Conference with a 29-0 victory over Texas Tech at Memorial

Two missed tackles can cost you

Nebraska defensive backs Coach George Darlington said two tackles could have cut the Texas Tech offensive output by 52 yards, which would be a significant loss for a team that only had 127 yards of total offense in the 29-0 NU win.

Nebraska freshman Joe Walker, who made his first career start Saturday, missed a tackle on Tech's first drive that ended up as a 19-yard gain. On the play Red Raider senior flanker Malcolm McKenzie caught a pass from senior quarterback Zebbie Letheridge that gave Tech a first down at the Tech 40-yard line. Nebraska senior defensive end Grant Wistrom chased McKenzie down for the tack-

In the second half, Letheridge

hooked up with freshman Derek Dorris for a 33-yard gain on which Darlington said a defender missed a

However, he didn't qualify either of those as big plays as Nebraska.

"We certainly didn't give up any long plays on the ground," Darlington
