**Do You Know That?**

Do you know that twenty-six sheep are necessary to produce a year's supply of wool for one soldier in the United States army.

The quartermaster department has just ordered twenty million more yards of cloth for overcoats and uniforms.

And 3,600,000 more neckties.

The army's fluid milk bill is forty thousand dollars daily. Butter, cheese, also bought in huge quantities, are extra.

About fifteen percent of the quartermasters purchases of food for the army are for fresh fruits and vegetables. It is estimated thirty-five million dollars will be spent this year for these items alone.

There is spice in the army. Five million pounds of spiced lunch meat, Vienna sausage and chile were added recently to the quartermaster's stores.

Ski troopers operating in Alaska are to be warmed with tiny new stoves weighing less than three pounds each. But they produce intense heat from either alcohol, gasoline or kerosene and also may be used for individual cooking.

The army soon will be shaking moth flakes out of its winter clothing but 2,600,000 more pounds have been ordered to aid in defense of the huge stores of woollens.

Soldiers sometimes play with toys. However, not children's toys. They are trucks, miniature buildings, replicas of small cities, each built to scale to help teach solution of difficult problems in transportation, distribution and storage of quartermaster's supplies.
