

Plenty of Action in World Series



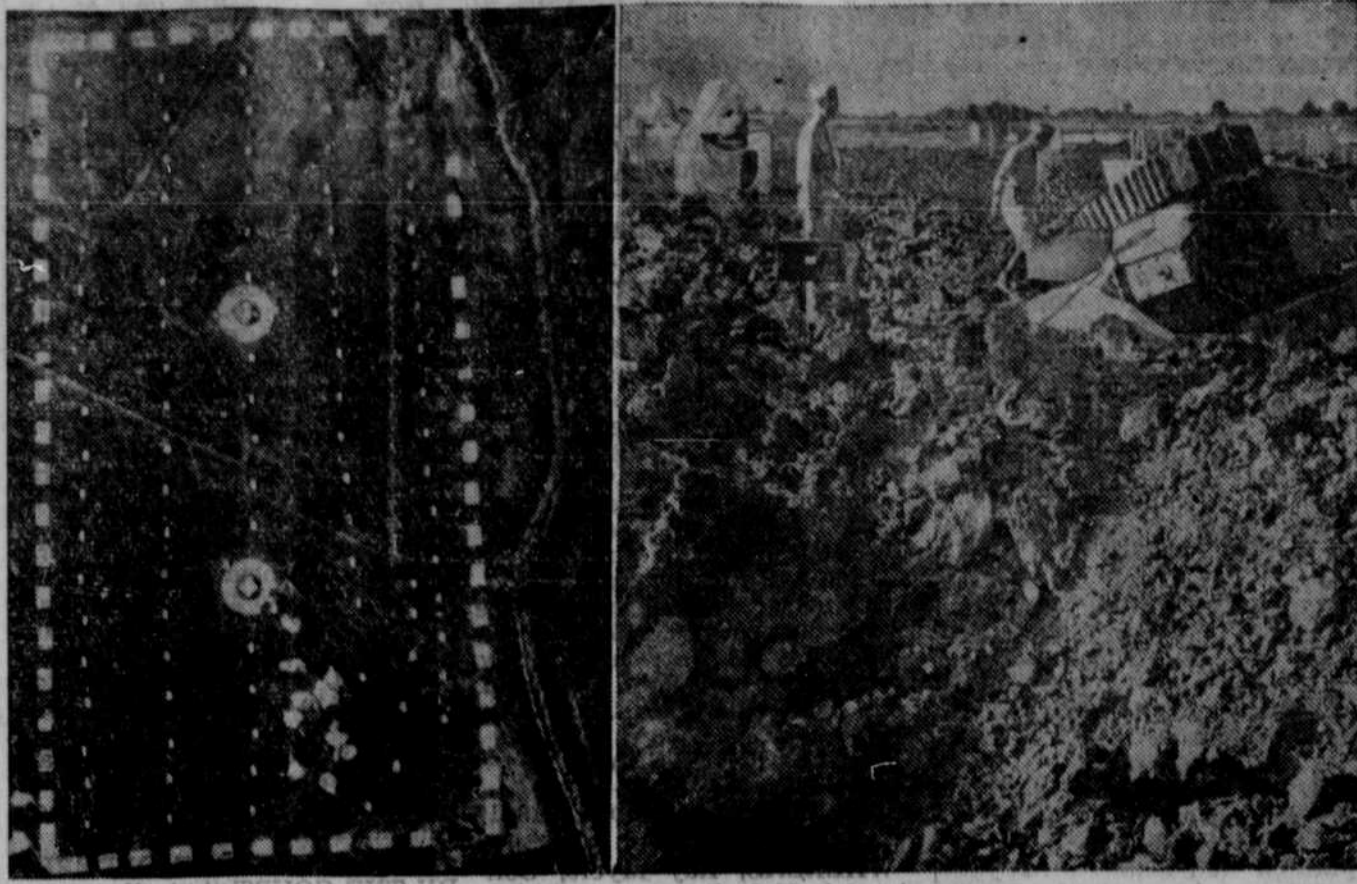

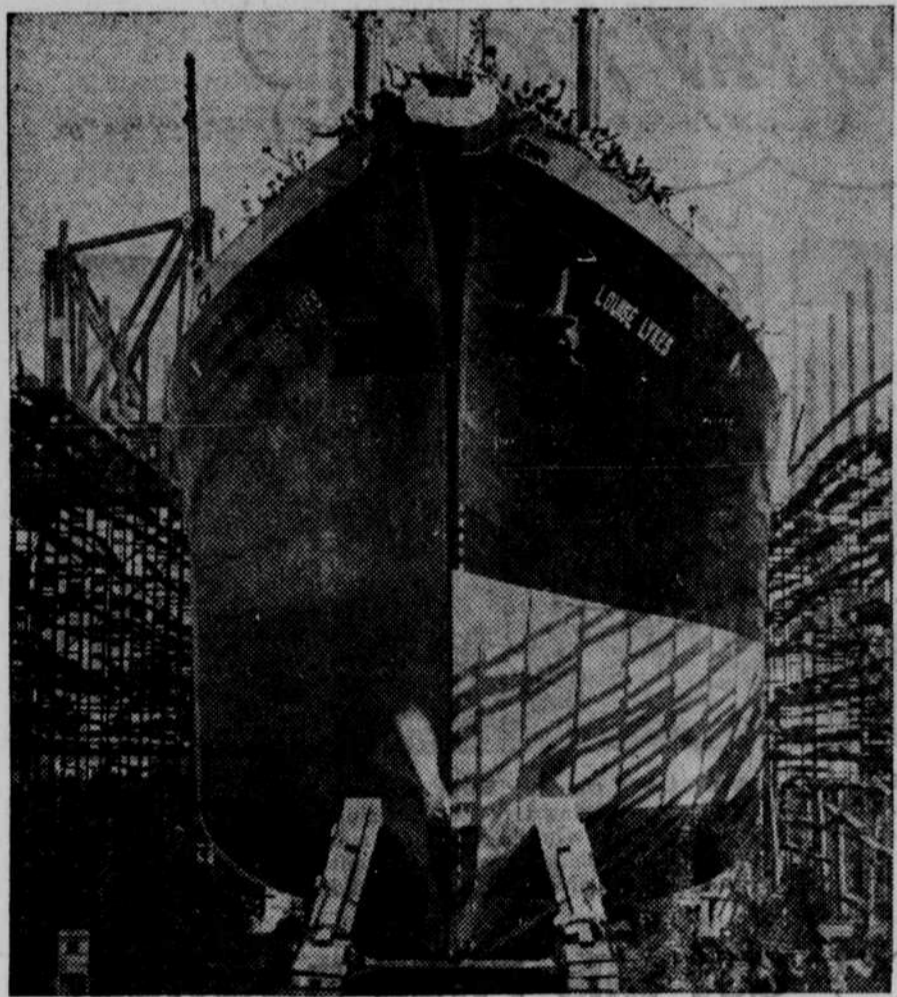
Cordell Hull, who has served as secretary of state longer than any other man in U. S. history, celebrates his seventieth birthday. The cake was presented by Washington correspondents.

A 'Liberty Ship' Hits the Water



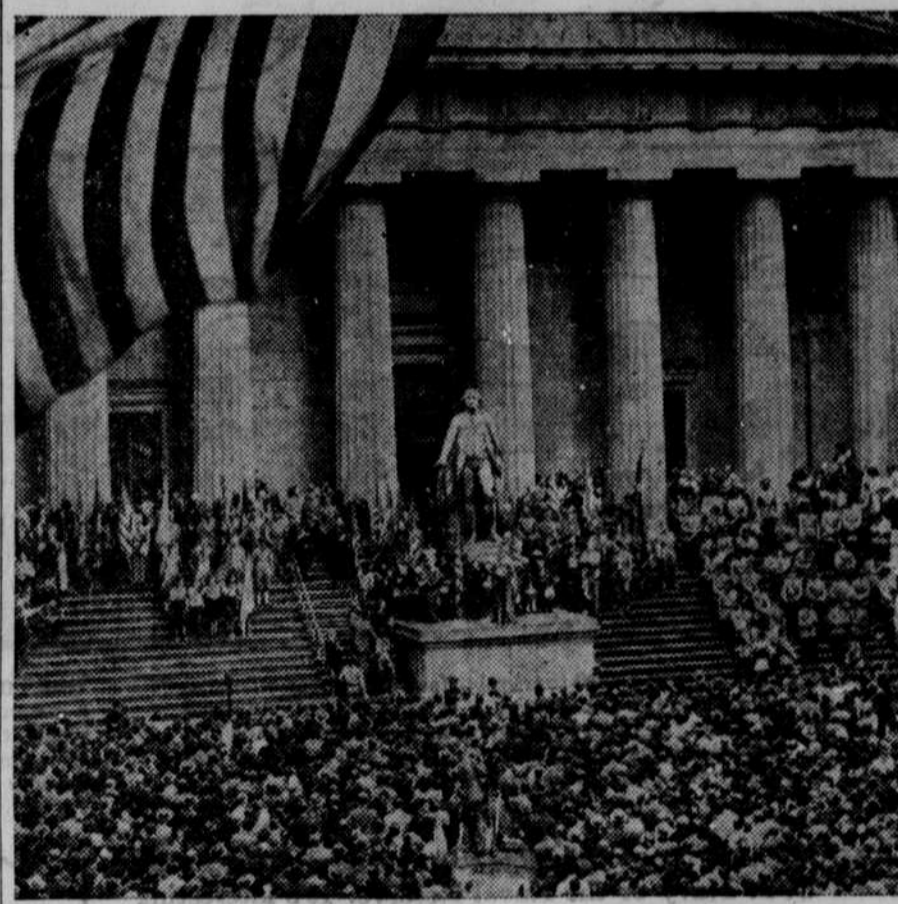
