Chairman Rooney Says Campaign Organized

O'Neill Students are assisting in salvage work to secure supplies needed for war production.

Mr. James Rooney, Salvage Chairman of Holt County, gave an enlightening talk to the junior high and high school students in the O'Neill Public School last Thursday afternoon on the importance of salvage in meeting our war needs. Such materials as waste paper, old rubber, and scrap iron are especially valuable in the manufacture of war supplies.

Mr. Rooney explained that a truck would be available each Saturday to collect waste paper and old rubber in O'Neill from the houses and business firms. Students from both the O'Neill Public School and St. Mary's Academy will work on Saturdays to help collect salvage materials.

The students in the Public School have organized a Salvage Crew with Harold Calkins as Chairman, Warren Burgess, co-Chairman, and Ted Manzer as Adviser.

There will be a crew of sixteen students work this Saturday, with eight for the morning shift and eight for the afternoon shift. The salvage collected by these crews will be sold and the proceeds given to the Red Cross.
