

LIVESTOCK PRICES RULE STEADY ON LOCAL MARKET

The current high prices established during the past several weeks continued on practically all classes of livestock at the auction here last Monday. Receipts were somewhat heavier than a week ago and the day's supply found ready outlet as the demand remains active. A good, strong undertone dominated the market throughout the whole affair was what stockmen call a "red hot" market.

The best steer calves, weighed around 350 lbs. topped at \$14.50. The bulk of the calves sold from \$12.50 to \$13.70. Heifer calves, of which there was a good supply cashed at \$11.00 to \$11.75 with a few reaching higher levels. Several large bunches were sold with prices scoring mostly in the upper brackets.

In the yearling division prices ranged from \$11.50 to \$12.50 on the bulk of the steer run. Yearling heifers sold mostly from \$9.50 to \$10.50 and the supply was not too plentiful.

The cow supply was heavy and prices on the better grades of beef cows were stronger than last Monday. Some of the best heavy beef cows reached \$9.25.

Heiferettes of good quality paid as high as \$9.90. The bulk of the beef cows moved at prices ranging from \$7.75 to \$8.75. Bulls were stronger in price with most of the days supply selling from \$9.00 to \$9.50.

Hog receipts were increased here last Monday and prices reflected the general price trends. Lightweight butchers and feeders scaling 160 lbs. topped at \$13.70. Bulk of the butchers hogs moved at \$13.35 to \$13.40 extreme top \$13.45.

Gilts paid from \$13.25 to \$13.60. Sows ranged in price from \$13.10 to \$13.25. Feeder pigs sold upwards to \$15.25.

A few horses and mules finished off the day's offering. Next sale on Monday, April 27.
