The 'Holt County Chapter of the American Red Cross is organizing the Home Nursing Program in the various branches of the county chapter, with Mrs. E. C. Weller of Atkinson serving as chairman. Classes are required to have a minimum of 24 hours of instruction covering a period of not less than six weeks, and are trught by graduate nurses who are authorized by the area headcuarters of the Red Cross. The ourse covers such subjects as: 1. Individual health and personal hygiene. 2. Healthful home environment, care of the home, normal family

life. Home care of the sick, care of the chronic and the aged, common illnesses and emergencies. 4. Care of mothers and babies, small children, in health and in illness




