Japs Launch Two **Attacks On Alaska**

The Navy announced Wednesday night that the Japanese had made a second attack on Dutch Calif., son of Mrs. John Carr of Harbor, Alaska, six hours after O'Neill, were married at 7:30 four bombers and fifteen fighters

All Japanese who are members of the United States Army have been removed from the western defense command and Fourth Army, except three on the post at Fort Ord, California, who are on special assignments.
