Holt County Pioneer Dies In Wyoming

Merritt Hulitt Clark was born in Port Jervis, New York, Saturday, June 30, 1866. He moved when twelve years of age with his parents to Inman, Nebraska. In his early years he taught school and sold life insurance. He lived in Bradish, Nebr., Clarkson, Nebr., Howells, Nebr., and Glenrock, Wyo., and worked as station agent for the C. & N. W. Railway at those places, covering a period of almost forty years. In 1928 he bought and operated, with his two youngest sons, Alvin and Edward, a gasoline bulk plant and filling station at Glenrock, Wyo.

He married Anna Agusta Richardson on May 14, 1891. To this union were born six children: Roy, of Kenmore, N. Y.; Elmer, of Costa Mesa, Calif.; Richard, of Indianapolis, Ind.; Myra, of Hollywood, Calif.; Grace, of Hawthorne, Calif. and Lawrence, of Liberal, Kansas.

Anna Agusta Clark passed on in October, 1902, and was laid to rest at Inman, Nebr.

In August, 1903, he married Ellen Elizabeth Abbott of Boulder, Colo. To this union was born Edward Grant Clark, of Glenrock, Wyo., and Alvin Gerency Clark, of Wilmington, Calif. He moved to Glenrock in 1908, where he made his home until the time of his death.

Ellen Elizabeth Clark passed on in April, 1914. She was laid to rest at Inman, Nebr. He kept this family together until grown, all still living and present for their father's burial.

Deceased was always active in civic affairs and was president of the school board at Glenrock for a number of years. Mr. Clark was a lover of home and labored unceasingly for the interests of home and community in which he lived, and no sacrifice was too great for him to make for their betterment. In spite of his years Mr. Clark was in very good health. He was a member of the Reform Church.

His untimely death was caused by a car accident and he passed away at 5:50 o'clock on Tuesday morning, October 6, at Douglas, Wyo. He leaves his children and one sister, Mrs. C. D. Keyes, of Inman, Nebr.; twelve grandchild-

ren and many other relatives and friends to mourn his passing.

Services were held at Glenrock on October 8, also at Inman at the Methodist church at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon, October 9, with Rev. E. B. Maxcy in charge.

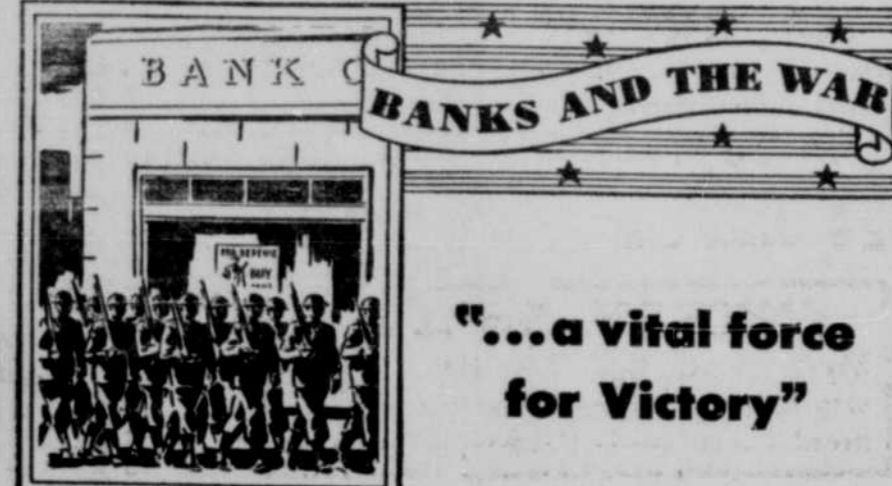
