LEGAL NOTICE AS TO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 3, 1942

Pursuant to the provisions of Legislative Bill No. 191, Fifty-fifth Session Nebraska State Legislature 1941, there will be submitted to the voters at the general election to be held on November 3, 1942, for their approval or rejection, the following proposed amendment:

"Section 1. That Sec. 4, Article IX, Constitution of Nebraska, be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 4. The legislature shall provide by law for the election of such county and township officers as may be necessary: Provided, however, the legislature may provide by law for a form of county government in which county officers may be elected or appointed, but such form shall be optional with each county and shall obtain in any county only upon the adoption thereof by the electors of such

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment, if adopted, shall be in force and effect on and after the first Thursday after the first Tuesday in January, 1943; and it may be made an additional section in Article XVII of the constitution of
