Oklohoma also retired Senator Lee, one of the wheel horses of the present administration and elected E. H. Moore republican. This was a real upset. South Dakota elected the present governor, Harlan J. Bushfield, senator, who defeated Tom Berry, former governor, and he will replace Senator Bulow, democrat, who was defeated in the primary. West Virginia also elected a republican senator, Chapman Revercomb.

As a result of the balloting on Tuesday the republicans goined 9 seats in the senate and there is still one seat in doubt. This will give the republicans 38 members in the next senate as against 56 for the democrats.

In the House the republicans gained 41 members, having elected 206 to the next congress to 218 democrats. There are still seven still in doubt. This will give the democrats a small majority in the house during the next two years and materialy decreases their majority power in the sen-

Judging from the last election it appears that the voters are fed up with the New Deal and are about ready to turn the running of the government over to the republican party. When great in-dustrial states like Michigan, joins with the farm states of the midwest in repudiating New Deal policies, there is hope that the people of the United States are at last beginning to realize the dangers to this country from the
