Big Run Of Livestock At Local Market Monday At the sale of the local livestock auction a heavy run of livestock of all kinds showed up. Prices for horses, sheep and cattle were good but the hog market was lower than last week. We had about 70 horses, very few good horses. They were mostly just ordinary work horses. Only a few southern mares showed up, however prices seemed to be very satisfactory. We had a very good cattle sale, about 300 head were sold. The little light cattle and cows continued to be the popular kind. Our good steer calves brought from \$15.00 to \$16.00 per hundred. Plainer ones sold on down less. We did not have many heifer calves, however we had a few good bred lightweights that brought up to \$15.00 per hundred. We had a few good yearling steers up to \$14.00 in price and the long end of them brought from \$13.00 to \$13.75, however we had plainer kinds that sold on down less. The yearling heifer run was very light. In two-year old steers, we had more of them than we have had in the last two weeks or so. They were a little harder to move. The quality of them was not too good. They brought all the way from \$12.00 to \$13.00. In cows, we did not have any real good ones; our good cows brought from \$9.00 to \$10.25. We had a few odd head on up to \$10.75. Our feeding cows brought from \$8.50 to \$9.25. Our bull run was light. We had the heaviest hog run of the season.
