This subject was recently emphasized by Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of the American Medical Association. He says many people think only in terms of vitamin deficiency in connec-..... tion with nutrition.

However, when the facts become known regarding conditions now prevailing in Europe, Dr. Fishbein feels certain it will be found that protein starvation is far more serious than vitamin deficiency because it produces a breakdown of human tissues. This in turn opens the way to disease to a far gleater extent than is ordinarily caused by vitamin de-

"In this connection," states Milton Hult, president of the Na-tional Dairy Council, "the United States is in a fortunate position, in that the amount of protein in the American diet coming from milk and its products has greatly increased in the past few decades. Actually, milk, cheese and ice cream furnish 40 percent more protein for human consumption than was true in this country 30 years ago. Since the proteins of milk are of very highest quality they are of special importance during the emergency period in suplementing the less complete ones in many other foods. 
