King Emanuele issued a proc-lamation stating that he had as-ed prominent in Italian affairs, sumed command of all Italian forces for "a stand against those who have wounded the sacred soil of Italy."

Badoglio also issued a procla-mation saying "on orders of his majesty the king, I am taking over the military government of the country with full powers." "The war continues," he added.
