The Frontier, August 23, 1923.

Last Tuesday the Newport baseball team crossed bats with Emmet on the Emmet diamond and were defeated by a score of 4 to 2.

Ferdinand H. Shoemaker died in St. Catherine's hospital in Omaha August 17, 1923, following a short illness. He was 48 years of age at the time of his death. He is survived by his wife and three children. He had been a resident of Winner, S. D., since 1909, when he moved there from this county.
