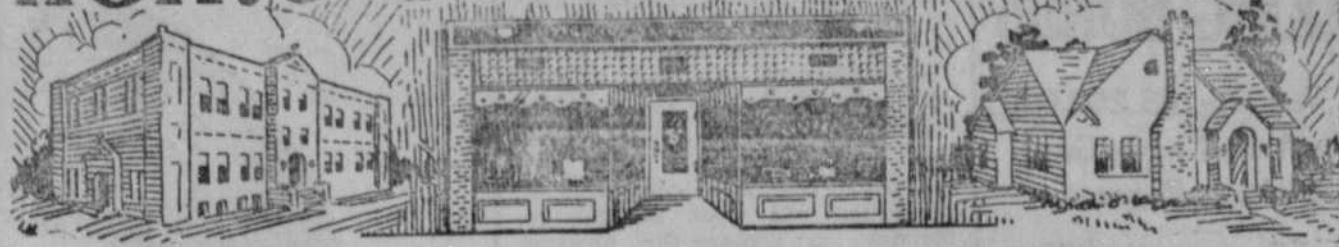
PLEASANT VALLEY.
