Record Rituals Ere They Perish

Younger Generation of Fox Indians Cause Leaders Concern

Tama, Ia., Aug. 9. (AP)—Striving to complete his record of the old pagan rituals of the Fox Indians of lowa before modern influences complete their obliteration, Dr. Truman Michelson, Smithsonian ethnolo-

Michelson, Smithsonian ethnologist of the Bureau of American Ethnology, is spending his 17th consecutive summer among the peaceful, industrious survivors of this once war like tribe.

Until recently the Foxes observed their rituals in a reverential spirit, but the younger generation has taken a different attitude, attending the festivals primarily for social purposes and to take advantage of the abundant feasts, so that the old the abundant feasts, so that the old spirit is likely to perish with the passing of the aging elders of the

These ceremonials chiefly in the spring and fall and, unlike Christian and other familiar religious practices, have little to do with rules of conduct. Each ritual has a distinct purpose, such as the avoidance of disease, insurance of success in war, and the insurance of success in war, and the insurance of retribution in case anyone should speak ill against the chief's village, and is supposed to have been ordered by supernatural spirits.

In summer, Dr. Michaelson relates, feasting and dancing are connected with religious worship, but in winter there is no denting.

in winter there is no dancing. Fea-tures of the summer festivals are the four dances, the ceremonial eat-ing of dog meat, and a prayer to the spirit of fire and he who lies with his face in the smokehole (e. i. the sky) asking that they inform the mythical originator of the festival that worship is being held.

The Foxes probably never exceed-

ed 1,200 in number, in Dr. Michelson's opinion, but they figured prominently in the early history of the continent. Attempting to tax the trade route between Louisiana and Canada, they became involved in a 50-year war with the French. By breaking up that route they were partly responsible for the loss of Canada by the French.

Although they came under French and Catholic influence around 1640 and received some intermixture of European blood in the early days of American colonization, they always have been a conservative people and have maintained rigidly their racial purity since their return to Iowa from Kansas in the Civil war period. On the present reservation near Tama last year only one of the 375 Foxes was a half breed.

LONDON'S AIR PERIL

The problem assigned to Britain's royal air force this year was the defense of London. The cruising radius and weight-carrying capacity of airplanes has been increased since the war to such an extent that London, undefended, is vulnerable to air attacks launched from any military or naval stronghold in western Europe. For some time the British have realized that their naval defenses are antiquated. They learned during the war that even with cumbersome dirigibles, a determined enemy can menace their civilian pop-ulation. They were not misled by their ground battery defense. It comforted civilians, but it only annoyed the enemy. The air defense of London is a live military prob-

The British divided their air force and assigned some to attack and some to defend. Fifty seven times the attacking force attempted to get into positions from which they could inflict major damage on the city. In nine of these attempts they com-pletely outwitted the defending

force. While both defenders and attackers had at stake something in the way of military reputation, the maneuvers naturally lacked the fierceness, both in attack and in de-fense, of warfare but it is fair to assume that the result is fairly representative of what might happen in

London military authorities seem to take a very grave view of the result. Military air supremacy rests with France, commercial air supremacy is in Germany, and Mussolini has lately entered the field with his customary efficiency and determination. Two things bother the British particularly. Since they are convinced that the next war will be fought from and in the air, they have to consider that a prepared foe could declare war on them in the morning and by evening lay waste most of the military and naval bases and factories in the British isles. The second cause for anxiety is the fate of the civilian population. No ring of fighting craft coast guard guardsmen, it is feared, will avail against an enemy air fleet, and no enemy in the air will or can choose

his victims.

Naturally the British will take steps to prepare for such defense as they may need. They will go farth-

In all likelihood, however, the result of the maneuvers will cause British statesmen to take a firmer grip on plans to avoid another bitter war. It is plausible to argue that no civilized nation will kill the women and children of its enemy, but it is not safe to trust any nation facing defeat and invasion. It is safer and wiser to asume that any nation committed to war will do what it must to win.
And this being so the fight should

life. National poverty may bar a
major war short of another decade time enough, once the great powers set their head to it, to divert the war spirit in all men to less de-structive purposes.

The modern boy or girl gets very independent and people in the school business can tell of extreme cases of this spirit. Some boys and fuse to attend the schools to which their parents send them. They may be so hard to get along with that they get hazed at school and they come crying home that they can't do any more.

In such cases parents may feel that the only thing is to have them taught by some private tutor or sent away to some small class or school where special attention is given to difficult cases. Some children are so constituted that that is the only thing to do. But in many cases the trouble is simply willfulness, which should be cured.

People remark on hearing such a story that when they were children there was never any question about "consenting" to go to school. When the school term began, they were in school whether they "consented" to go or not.

There are not many children who carry their resistance so far. but there are many who constantly refuse to do the things their parents tell them to do and their parents seem perfectly helpless. This lack of discipline results partly from feeling that that it is more effective to secure children's willing co-operation in the things they are expected to do. Still there is such a thing as deferring too much to their desires. It can be carried so far that a child fails to get the training he needs.

In such a case he is turned loose with the idea that he can always have his own way. He may be able to bluff his parents, but if he tries to bluff the whole community or the people for whom he works, he soon finds himself up against it and he gets into serious trouble. 

Hot Oil Employed to Wipe Out Mosquitoes

Hot fuel oil, sprayed along the thores of the lakes in the Canal zone, s a most efficacious weapon against nalaria-laden mosquitoes. This oil, a olg factor in the tight which is culminating in certain abolition of the insect, has destroyed breeding places in the Pedro Miguel and Gatum lakes.

The method used to spray the oil necessitates the use of a rowboat carrying a tank containing 150 gallons of oil, and a crew of three men. One man rows, one works a hand pump and the other handles the spray nozzle. The hot oil is sprayed on the shore line as fast as the boat can be propelled. This surface filming has been found positive and complete.

Wind action and wavelets carry the oil into every nook and cranny, even to a considerable distance from the point of application. A rigid inspection follows every oiling to determine if it has been done thoroughly.

Elsewhere than in the lake areas, mosquito breeding is controlled chiefly by training of streams and by draining and filling.
