

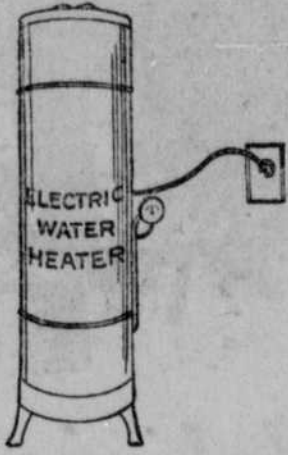

Past Grand Master of the I. O. O. F. lodge of Nebraska, T. J. Fletcher, of Orchard, Nebraska, has been appointed grand treasurer of the order to succeed F. B. Bryant, of Omaha, deceased. Mr. Fletcher is the third man to hold this office since the institution of the order in the state. Mr. Bryant, the late treasurer, held the office for thirty-one years.

As a result of the arrests made in the liquor raids last week Jack McAllister of Atkinson, was fined \$200 and thirty days in jail and costs; Will McAllister of Atkinson, was fined \$100 and costs; they both appealed to the district court. A similar looking negro has confessed to the axe murder of the two ladies and one man last week. He was picked up in a western state Wednesday.

J. H. Meredith of this city received a message last Thursday announcing the death of his only sister, Mrs. Sally Simpson, at Harrington, Delaware. The funeral services were held Sunday. Owing to the distance J. H. Meredith of this city and a brother, J. P. Meredith, South Sioux City, were unable to attend the funeral; the brother, S. P. Meredith, South Bend, Indiana, however, was able to reach there in time for the services.

On November 26th, the State Railway Commission granted the Pioneer Bus Line of this city, the privilege of doing local work and carrying passengers from station to station between O'Neill and Ainsworth. This will be a benefit to the commercial trade, teachers, professional people and to both bus lines. The Pioneer bus will leave O'Neill at 7:30 a. m. and arrive at Ainsworth at 8:30 p. m. Leaving and arriving at these hours it is possible to make Chadron, Sioux City and Grand Island and the intervening cities in the least possible time and with the best connections.

### THE DISTRICT COURT.

The case of M. S. Abdalla against the Merchants Mutual Insurance Company was being tried when we went to press last week. The jury found for the plaintiff in the sum of \$1,000 and interest.

The next case to be tried was The State of Nebraska vs. Floyd House. The jury was out only a few minutes and found the defendant guilty. He has not yet been sentenced. House was accused by a young girl, residing in the eastern part of the county, of being the father of her unborn child. House was married to another girl a few months ago.

The case now being tried by the jury is the Matter of the Estate of Catherine Wabbs, deceased. It is the intention of the court officials to finish the case this Wednesday evening and adjourn over Thanksgiving.

### GARAGE AND FILLING STATION ENTERED BY THIEVES SUNDAY NIGHT

### HELEN MARIE SCHWISOW.

Miss Helen Marie Schwisow passed away in the Lutheran hospital in Norfolk last Saturday evening about ten o'clock. Death was due to a fracture of the skull which she received in an auto accident that occurred two weeks ago, when she, accompanied by Miss Beryl Winchell were thrown from the Schwisow truck when it collided with a tree one and one-half miles west of O'Neill. Miss Helen was taken to the Norfolk hospital last week and everything was done to stay the hand of death, but to no avail.

The funeral services were held from the Presbyterian church Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, conducted by the pastor, Rev. H. H. Beers; interment was in Prospect Hill cemetery.

The high school, seventh and eighth grades were dismissed and attended the services in a body.

The floral offerings were many and beautiful.

The sympathy of the entire community goes out to the bereaved father and the brother and sisters, as

a series of misfortunes seem to have overtaken the family.

The following was read by Rev. Beers at the funeral services:

Helen Marie Schwisow was born at Daykin, Nebraska, April 18, 1912, and died in the Lutheran Hospital at Norfolk, Nebraska, Saturday evening, November 24, 1928. Death came as a result of an automobile accident.

In 1919 she came with her parents to O'Neill and resided here until her death. Helen was a Junior in the O'Neill High School; she was a good girl, giving up her school work last year in order that her brother might graduate; great credit is due her in helping her father keep the home together after the mother's death a little more than a year ago.

Helen was well thought of and respected by her classmates and friends; faithful was she to her church, thus giving a good example to all who knew her.

At the time of her death she was 16 years, 7 months and 6 days of age.

She leaves to mourn her loss, her father, one brother, Harlow, and three sisters, Hazel, Alice and Eunice. The relatives who could be present at the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Burkhart and children, of Fairbury, Nebraska; the grandmother, Mrs. Schimmel, of Western, Nebraska; also Mrs. Floyd Sims, of Arlington, Nebraska.
