Food Market

The State Journal carried the account of the funeral services on Wednesday, for the late Charles L. Anderson, of Crete, Nebraska, who died in Lincoln, Monday. Mr. Anderson was superintendent of the O'Neill schools during the years 1894 and 1895. He taught in Atkinson the preceding year. Mr. Anderson had formed a wide circle of acquaintances during the years that he was teacher and superintendent of schools at Atkinson, O'Neill, Ord, Bradshaw, Culbertson and Oxford. For six years Mr. and Mrs. Anderson lived at Grand Island. For the last fourteen years Mr. Anderson has been traveling in Wyoming, Colorado and Nebraska as a salesman of school supplies.

PAGE POSTOFFICE ROBBED EARLY THURSDAY MORNING

The postoffice at Page, Nebraska, fifteen miles southeast of O'Neill, was robbed some time during Thursday night, December 13th. The dial was knocked from the door with a "jimamy." Stamps amounting to \$143 and cash amounting to \$77 was taken.

The postoffice at Oakdale was also robbed sometime during the same night. Their loss was stamps \$700, and cash amounting to about \$3.00.

The only clue to the whole affair was the fact that night Marshal Campbell of Butte was kidnapped some time earlier and brought to about eighteen miles north of O'Neill with a blanket over his head; he was given his liberty after the lights of the car were turned out. The parties abducting the marshal were driving a new Ford car. The marshal was released about one o'clock in the morning.

BIG CHECK FORGING RING UNCOVERED IN NORTHERN HOLT

O'Neill has had the experience of having a couple of bad check artists clean-up on a number of our businessmen.

On Thursday afternoon of last week Roy E. Sanders accompanied by Harvey Soverkrubbe, dropped into the George Bressler store and purchased a bill of goods and paid an account which totaled about \$18.00; Sanders presented a check for \$127.74 made out to H. M. Ward and drawn on a Lynch bank and signed by "Joe Micanek." The check was protected by a protector bearing the name Farmers Elevator. Mr. Bressler gave him a check for the difference which Sanders took to the Mellor Company and cashed when he purchased some oil. Checks made out similarly were cashed at the Arbuthnot & Reka Chevrolet garage for \$263.00 for which they were given

a return check for \$128.00 which was not cashed. The D. Abdouch store were given two similar checks amounting to \$86.00 which Mr. Abdouch cashed in the O'Neill bank and which were paid by the Lynch bank. Sanders and Soverkrubbe evidently went to Omaha as the Lynch bank was called Saturday to o. k. a check that they were trying to cash there. They were later apprehended and are being held. Emil Sedvany residing south of Lynch was arrested Wednesday and is reported to have confessed to stealing eighteen checks, the ink, pen and check protector from the Farmers Elevator. He also implicates others in the deal whom he claims to have hired to do some of the work and with whom he was to give a 50-50 split. The deputy sheriff accompanied by County Attorney Julius D. Cronin and others are in the north country this afternoon and expect to return tonight with at least one more of the gang.

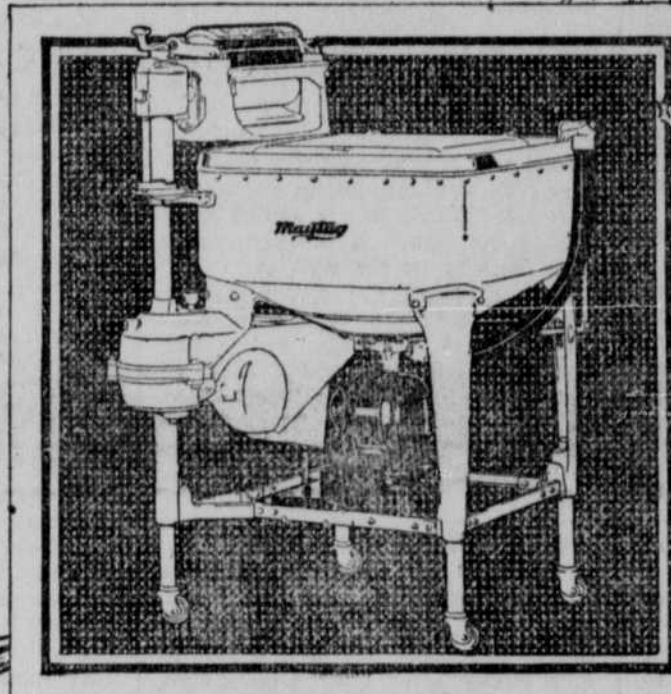
