**FUNERAL IS HELD FOR
 PIONEER HOMESTEADER**

 Funeral services were held last Sat-
 urday morning at St. Joseph's Catholic
 church in this city for Henry Winkler,
 Sr., age 80 years, forty-six years a
 homesteader in Holt county thirteen
 miles northeast of Atkinson, who died
 at his home Thursday, December 20,
 after a short illness from pneumonia.
 The service was conducted by the pas-
 tor, Rev. John Pieper, and burial was
 made in St. Joseph's cemetery.

Mr. Winkler was born on the 22nd
 of October, 1848, in Bienstadt, Ger-
 many. He was a veteran of the Fran-
 co-Prussian War in 1870-71. In No-
 vember, 1879, he came to America and
 settled on a farm near David City,
 Nebraska. At David City on the 15th
 of August, 1880, he was united in mar-
 riage with Agnes Steskal.

In 1882 Mr. Winkler and his family
 came to Holt county where they home-
 steaded on a place two miles north
 and eleven miles east of Atkinson.
 This farm is now occupied by his son,
 Henry Winkler, Jr. Mr. and Mrs.
 Winkler moved to a place on the out-
 skirts east of town in 1909 and have
 since made their home there. In 1910
 he made a visit to his old home in
 Germany and was accompanied back
 to America by his niece, Susan Wink-
 ler.

Mr. Winkler is survived by his wife,
 who is 67 years of age, and four
 daughters and three sons, Mrs. Fred
 Meyers, of Anaheim, California; Mrs.
 Frank Henderson, Mrs. A. D. Brown
 and Mrs. L. A. Daniels, of Atkinson;
 John Winkler, of Denver, Colorado;
 Henry and Joe Winkler, of Atkinson.
 There are also twenty-six grand-
 children. Two daughters preceded him
 in death, Josephine in infancy, and
 Mrs. Anna Gift at the age of 26 in
 Omaha twenty years ago.

 R. Dickson home.

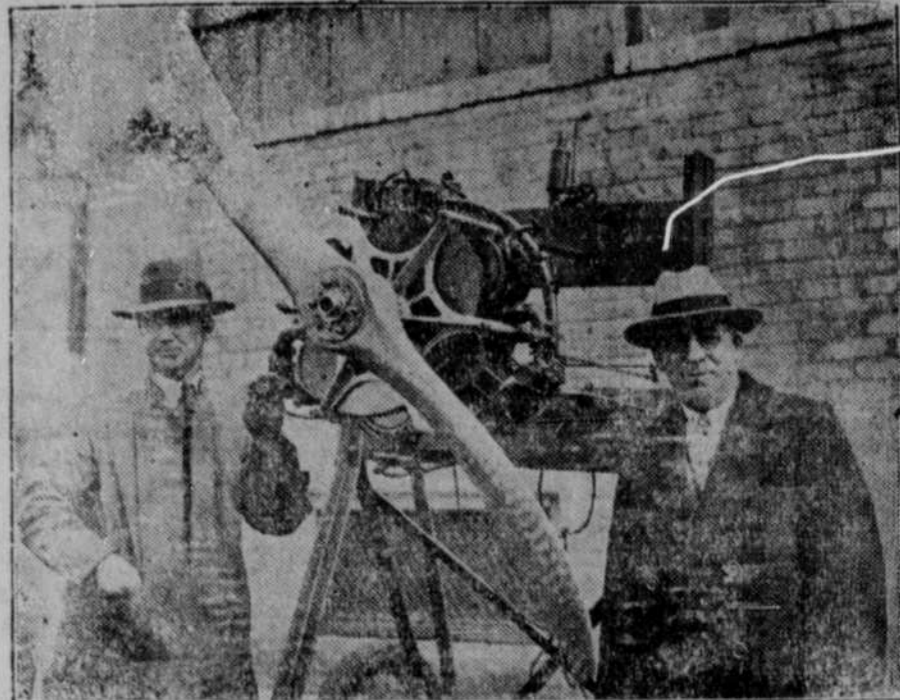
Miss Marjorie Dickson returned to
