**NINETY-ONE YEAR OLD PIONEER PASSES AWAY**

Svan Johnson, 91-year-old Holt county pioneer died Friday, March 22, at the farm home of his son, J. V. Johnson, in the Celia neighborhood north of Atkinson. Mr. Johnson was born in Sweden April 14, 1838 and has been a resident of Holt county for forty-five years.

In 1860 Mr. Johnson was united in marriage to Ingar Johnson. To this union eleven children were born, five of whom died in infancy. In 1883 he, with his family emigrated to the United States, living near Oakland, Nebraska, that year. The family moved to Holt county in 1884 where he has since made his home except four years spent in Saskatchewan, Canada.

Mr. Johnson was preceded in death, in this country, by his wife, who died October 19, 1914, and daughter and son, Anna and C. August, who died at Oakland in 1900 and 1928 respectively. He is survived by two sons and two daughters, Svan J. Johnson, St. Ann, California; J. Victor Johnson, Atkinson; Mrs. Herman Anderson, Oakland, Nebraska; Mrs. Peter Monson, Wausa, Nebraska.

He belonged to the church of the Swedish Lutheran faith all his life, the last membership being in the Lutheran congregation at Baker, Nebraska. A short funeral service was held at the Johnson home Saturday evening, conducted by Rev. Vahle, after which the body was taken to Atkinson and prepared for shipment to Oakland, where funeral services were held at 2 o'clock p. m. Monday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Herman Anderson. Rev. Nelson of the Mission church conducted the service and interment was made in the Lutheran cemetery.

**AUSTIN FLEMING PASSES AWAY AFTER OPERATION**

Austin Fleming passed away at the Atkinson general hospital Saturday, March 23, where on the preceding Monday he had been operated upon and greatly relieved of suffering from intestinal tuberculosis. His recovery following the operation was little expected. Mr. Fleming had been in ill health the past few years, and the last year was bedfast most of the time. He is survived by his wife and two children, Violet and Bruce, students in the Atkinson public school.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2 p. m. at the Methodist church in Atkinson. The sermon was delivered by Rev. Chas. Kirkland, who used for his text II Kings, chapter 10, verse 15, "Is thine heart right?" Rev. Kirkland received the suggestion for this text when, in a conversation shortly before his death Mr. Fleming made the remark that his heart was right. Rev. Resmusson, pastor of the church, assisted in the service. Burial was made in Woodlawn cemetery, Atkinson.

Austin Lawrence Fleming was born in Atkinson October 31 1884, and lived practically his whole life in this city where he worked as a barber. At the time of his death he was 44 years of age. On May 17, 1908, he was married to Celia Clare Townsend of Crawford. To them were born two children, Violet Clare and Bruce Austin. Beside his wife and two children, Mr. Fleming is survived by his father, R. P. Fleming, a brother, Earl, and a sister, Mrs. J. Arnette, all of Sioux City, Iowa.

His father was in Atkinson to attend the funeral, the brother and sister being unable to come. Earl is at present taking treatment in a government hospital at Excelsior Springs, Mo.

**MRS. HANNAH M. FRENCH.**

Funeral services for Mrs. Hannah M. French, a Nebraska pioneer and a resident of Ewing for the past forty-six years who passed away Thursday evening March 21, 1929, at the age of 80 years, 3 months and 8 days, were held Sunday afternoon at two o'clock at Trinity Episcopal Church, with her pastor, Rev. M. A. Frazell in charge.

Mrs. French was born near Angola, Steuben County, Illinois, December 13, 1848 and grew to young womanhood at that place. On June 25, 1865, she was married to the late George W. French.

November 14, 1869, they moved to Dodge County, Nebraska, and later came to Cuming County, Nebraska. In 1883 they located on a farm near Ewing, Nebraska. Three children were born to Mr. and Mrs. French, two of whom are living. Mr. French preceded his wife in death six years ago and an only son, Ernest C. French, passed away ten months ago.

She is survived by two daughters, Mrs. L. B. Haneman, of Hollywood, California, and Mrs. J. L. Fisher, of Ewing, Nebraska, four grandchildren, and one great-grand-child; also three sisters, Mrs. Carrie Rich, of Madera, California, Mrs. Retta Stringer of Berkeley, California, and Mrs. Eva French, of Fort Wayne, Indiana.

For the last five years Mrs. French has made her home with her daughter, Mrs. J. L. Fisher. She was a member of Trinity Episcopal Church and a loyal worker in the same for many years, and belonged to the Woman's Relief Corps and the Degree of Honor. She was a kind, generous, noble Christian character.

Pallbearers were F. Noffke, L. E. Skidmore, F. Linder, D. W. Gemmill, John Berigan and J. W. Snyder. Interment was made in the Ewing cemetery.

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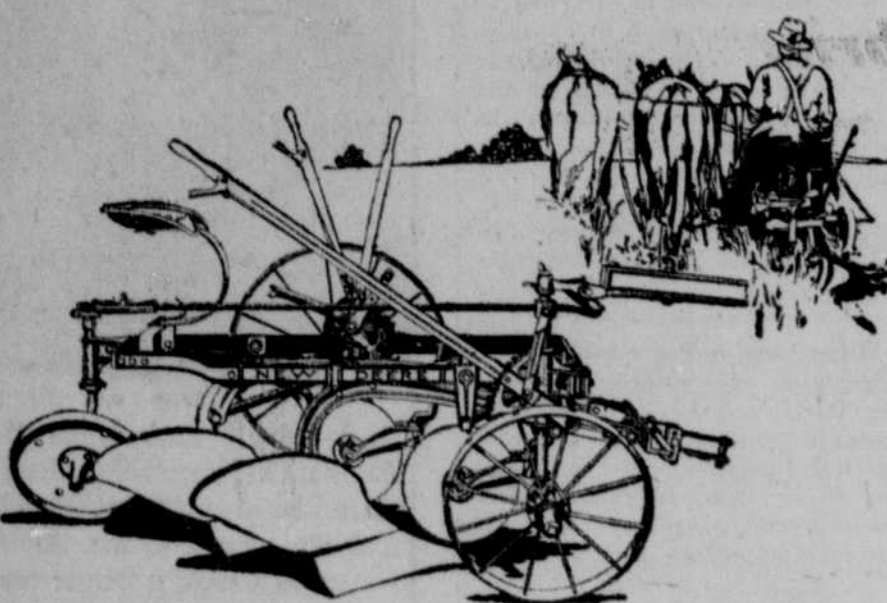
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
