In the Matter of the Dependency of Albert William Arno, aged 12 years. JOURNAL.

Now, on this 11th day of February, 1929, this matter again came on before the Court. The defendant, Albert William Arno was present in person in court with his grandmother, Jennie Arno.

And it appearing to the Court that the said Albert William Arno is no longer under the custody or control of or in charge of the Children's Home Society to whom he was committed by this Court on the 30th day of April, 1926, but that he is now with his grandmother, at Atkinson, Nebraska; that under present conditions his grandmother is a proper person to have his care and custody; that said boy has now reached the age of seven years.

Wherefore it is considered and ordered by the Court that the said Albert William Arno be, and he hereby is, committed to the care of his grandmother, Jennie Arno, Atkinson, Nebraska, and that the County Treasurer of Holt County, Nebraska, pay to the said Jennie Arno for the care and support of said boy the sum of ten dollars on the first day of March, April and May, 1929, and ten dollars for such purpose on this date; that Hugh L. James, of Atkinson, Nebraska, is

hereby designated as the probator of the will of the said boy shall report and who will have exclusive charge of obtaining employment for him and handling any money he may acquire thereby.
