OUR RED CROSS NURSE.

Frequently one is asked "What are the main objects or purposes of the Home Nursing Class that is taught in the high school this year?"

The following aims may be briefly outlined.

1. To develop in the student an appreciation for health and a desire to build those habits which will safeguard it.
2. To teach efficient and healthful methods of meeting the normal problems of home as a basis, also, for intelligent practice in those special problems of the care of the baby, the growing child, and the aged in the home.
3. To develop a basic understanding of the principles of prevention and control of disease.
4. To develop skill in the care of the sick under home conditions and according to the physician's direction in order that simple illnesses and home emergencies may be met with safety and efficiency.
5. To develop an intelligent understanding and an attitude of interest and cooperation in the solving of community health problems.
6. To help produce favorable environment and to raise standards of living through the cultivation of intelligent public opinion upon and individual responsibility in public health requirements.
7. To help potential teachers in their school health problems.
8. To make students capable of giving good, safe, sane treatment of accidents.
