Roy Warner is digging the basement for a new residence in the western part of the city.

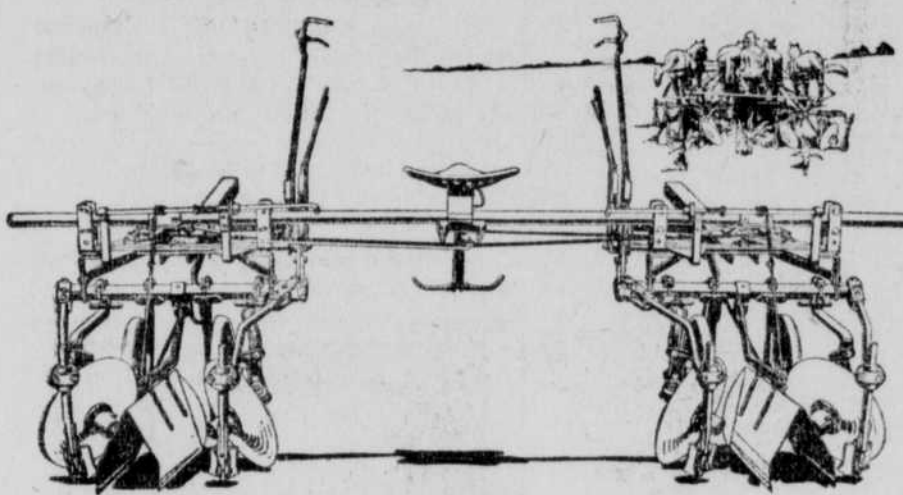
A daughter was born to Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Sheets, at their home in the southern part of the city.

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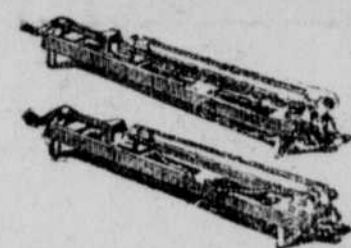
