"SIMPLE WAY TO KILL THE GERMS THAT BREED COLDS"

When the mixture becomes hot inhale the gas that is thrown off, killing any germs that breed colds. HELPING THE RADIATOR HEAT.

Careful investigations of the relative results of different paintings of steam and hot-water radiators that a colored lead painting gives off about four per cent more radiation than an unpainted radiator, whereas an aluminum coating over the bare iron loses about 16 per cent and all flake-metal coverings were relatively low. One test of a radiator painted first with brown lead and then coated with aluminum showed an efficiency of 103.
