was earned by the school at the same meet the year before. It was rather a chilly and windy day for a track meet but in spite of the fact several records were broken. The preliminaries were held in the forenoon consisting of the low hurdles, 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, broad jump, shot put and high hurdles. Charles Graham qualified in the first heat of the 100 yard dash with first place and a time of 10.9. Virgil Johnson ran the second heat of the hundred but failed to qualify. It was run in 10.4. In the 220 yard dash the first heat was taken by Charles Graham breaking the North Nebraska Relay record with a time of 23-1 seconds. Harold Shoemaker ran the third heat of the 220 but failed to qualify. In the broad jump preliminaries Charles Graham took second place with a jump of 18 ft. 11 1/2 inches. Harold Shoemaker also jumped. Elwin Thompson was entered in the shot put preliminaries but failed to qualify.

Of course the big noise of the meet came off in the afternoon. Our team had made a fine showing in the morning events and gave the boys all the pep and enthusiasm possible.

The afternoon events started off with the 120 yard high hurdles. Won by Norfolk. O'Neill was not entered.

Second came the pole vault, Bruce Rummel and Harold Sexsmith were the O'Neill entries. Chittick of Stuart took first place. Norfolk tied for second with Neligh.

The 100 yard dash was next. A good race but disgusting to us. Graham got a bad start and finished fifth. Lyamn of Bassett took first. Atkinson second and Plainview third. Time 10:5. In the half mile race E. Thompson

and Clyde Burge ran for O'Neill. Broderson from Neligh took first place. Time 2:21 a new record.

The 220 yard dash was won by Graham of O'Neill with a time of 23.1. The high jump was won by Honks of Butte, 5 feet 9 inches, a new record. Hanson of Norfolk and Tomlinson of O'Neill tied for second place, height 5 feet 5 inches.

In the discus preliminaries Tomlinson of O'Neill made the best throw of 100 feet 11 inches. In the finals Farmer of Stuart made a throw 3 inches farther than Dick taking first and giving second place to Dick.

The 440 yard dash was won by Schultz of Atkinson. Tomlinson was second.

In the broad jump Honke of Butte outjumped Graham by one-half an inch. Graham received second place. Honke's jump was 19 feet 10 1/2 inches.

The half mile relay was a surprise to us. We all looked for the boys to win. It was our race until the last lap. Graham started for us and a good lead was started out fine but he hit a Lad spot in the track and let a Norfolk man pass but it only took Chas. the snap of a finger to pass him up again. Tomlinson was the second man and we gained a further lead. Shoemaker was third and did fine. Thompson was the anchor man and did his best, but he had just been in an event preceding and was not so full of energy. Three men passed him within the last 50 yards of the tape leaving O'Neill fourth place.

Well in totalling the points we can say that we made a good showing and were proud of the boys.

#### LEGION MEET AUG. 26.

Lincoln, Neb., April 25. Tentative dates for the annual state convention of the American Legion, which is to be held at Hastings, have been fixed as August 26, 27 and 28, according to an announcement by Adjutant C. W. Conklin Thursday morning.

Conklin also announced that the state membership of the legion has been increased 1,500 over this time a year ago bringing the total membership to sixteen thousand. He predicts that this would be increased to nineteen thousand before the state convention is held.

Approximately five thousand delegates are expected to attend the convention. Conklin went to Omaha Thursday afternoon where he was to attend the annual spring party of the forty eight veterans organization.
