SUN SPOTS FAIL TO MAKE GOOD

Weather Bureau Heads Say Phenomena Not Yet Interpreted

WASHINGTON-(UP)-Old Sol ecently has staged his Big Parade of plain and fancy sunspots, but has not yet been able to establish himself as a reliable herald of mundane weather, in the opinion of official forecasters here.

The period when the sur exhibits the maximum number of spots, recurring at intervals of approximately 11 years, is now passing. Although the sunspot demonstrations in recent months have engrossed interest of scientists and public in all parts of the world, the United States Weather Bureau sees no new and dependable evidence that sunspots afford a reliable basis for weather forecasting, as pseudoscientists have alleged from time mmemorial.

"This bureau has given careful attention to studies of solar phenomena, but does not know of any study that has established a definite relation between weather conlitions and sunspots," Dr. Charles F. Marvin, chief of the Weather Bureau, said in a United Press in-

"It would be exceedingly difficult o establish such a relationship," he explained, "because of the rotation of earth and sun, and also because at any one time there are many cinds of weather occuring in difterent parts of the earth. How may one determine which particular cind of weather might theoreticaly be correlated with a sunspot which might at the time exist? We would welcome any rational demonstration that sunspots control the weather, but so far this has not peem proved, and some of the efforts to do so have been absurd.

"On the other hand, terrestrial nagnetic and auroral phenomena have been closely co-ordinated with the sunspots."

Doctor Marvin said that the Bureau possesses information conerning sunspots going back to the early Christan era, and that a complete detailed record of sunspots is available commencing in 1749. This ercord has been graphed by bureau scientists and shows that the number of sunspots goes through cycles of 11 years, this approximate period elapsing between the recurrence of the maximum fall roughly in the latter part of 1928 and early in 1929.

The record shows that in some months as many as 250 spots have been visible, while in other there may be none at all. The longest period when the sun was unspotted was 23 months from 1809 to 1811.

Gravitational Action Some scientists hold the view that the 11-year period is the result of gravitational action resulting from movements of the planets Jupiter and Saturn, but other authorities contend that the spots could be explained by internal action of the sun," Doctor Marvin

Branch Banking in Canada Floyd C. Chalmers in the American

Review of Reviews, There are only 10 banks in all Canada. One of these operates in a restricted area in southern Saskatchewan. The others are all large national banks with anywhere from 100 to 900 branches. Three of Canada's banks rank among the 10 largest banking institutions on this continent. Two of them rank among the 12 largest in the world.

Branch banking has worked out well in Canada. Bank failures have been rare and losses from bank failures comparatively small. While hank failure in Canada involves Kansas, which sought to show that short period fluctuations in the spottedness of the sun could be correlated with the movements of Venus, Mercury and the earth. Other scientists entertain the theory that the sunspots may be caused by meteors which strike the

The fact that spots may be observed on the disc of the sun arises from the fact that these areas are supposedly gaseous formations relatively colder than other parts of the sun and therefore appear as "spots" due to their darkness relative to the surrounding brighter

Spots Relatively Small The spots although sometimes of vast dimensions are small in proportion to the total surface of the sun. Thus the large spot which attracted scientific interest last April was estimated to be only 686 onemillionths of the sun's total surace, and a large spot measured at Harvard Observatory was only 1,846 one-millionths of the total surface.

In discounting the theory that sunspots may control the earth's weather, Doctor Marvin pointed out that systematic studies of solar radiation have shown that the daily fluctuations in radiation, after allowance for earthy influences, are only about one-fourth of one per cent of the total solar radiation. The percentage has decreased as observations have become more accurate.

Doctor Marvin therefore believes it more rational to interpret weather changes by the demonstrable effect of the sun's heat on the earth than by attributing weather changes to sunspots which apparently even from a theoretical viewpoint could exert only a very minor influence.

Dancer's Head Serves As Orchestra's Baton

-Frau Elsa VIENNA-Wisenthal, one of the most refined dancers of Vienna, hit upon the original idea of conducting an orchestra by movements of her head. No sooner had this idea flashed in her mind, than all Vienna took

it up with zest. The impulse, says Frau Wisenthal, which used to come from the conductor, will now come from the dancer. To this conception of the "dancing conductor" she has given

the name of "Battuta dances." Dancing, according to this new theory, will no longer be passive nor dependent on music. It will now be an active driving force. Any sign given by the dancer to the orchestra is to be an "artistic stimulus" or, as Frau Wisenthal calls it, "theme." This is to result in new an deloser relations be-

tween the dancer and the music. The dancer's movements will lead the orchestra, and at the same time, he or she will be carried by its sounds. Under this mutual influence closer unity of dancing and music is to be attained, leaving wider scope for the imagination.

Frau Wisenthal says that she will present her subject before the International Congress of Dancers in Paris this fall.

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
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
