office, Agricultural College, Lincoln.

4-H club work is now one of the greatest organizations in the state and boys and girls of this community will benefit a great deal by belonging to some kind of a club.

The circular prepared by O. O. Waggener and handed out on the train furnished a good summary of the ideas presented in the exhibits. Mr. Waggener used common words

and short, snappy sentences to tell the story of profitable pork production as it has been worked out by the college of agriculture and co-operating Nebraska farmers. The entire bulletin is based on actual experiments either of farmers or the experiment station at Lincoln.

If any one in this community failed to get a copy of the circular he may obtain it by writing the college of agriculture, Lincoln.

The Burlington railroad distributed an interesting four page circular

"Give the Pig a Chance." The railroad officials stated very plainly in the circular that the purpose of the train was not to increase pork production but to improve the efficiency of the hog business. The big idea is to raise the desired amount of pork with fewer sows and with less loss from disease. Farmers who have tried out the hog lot sanitation system have proved that this can be done.
