Of the 270 persons injured, 16 were permanently disabled.

School accidents mostly playground falls, resulted in eight injuries. Football was responsible for 2 others.

The hunting season has opened the past two weeks with two deaths, two permanent disabilities and eight serious injuries. Wonder if the Izaak Walton League cannot do something about preserving the hunters as well as the game?

Ten serious fires have occurred in the state in the last two weeks with losses running into several hundred thousand dollars.

A kitchen fire was started by kerosene poured from a can; a camp stove, possibly defective, was pumped up while lighted; a kerosene lamp was filled while lighted; two gasoline stoves were being generated and a snap lighter was filled with cleaning fluid. All of these are very simple operations duplicated daily in hundreds of homes but gasoline and even common kerosene under certain conditions are more explosive than dynamite. Those conditions prevailed.

Seven women and children are dead and seven other persons are injured and disfigured.

If the women and home-makers of our state can learn from this casualty list the need for great care in handling these terrific explosives, these people will not have died in vain.
