Strength Sapped By High Altitudes

LEADVILLE, COLO.— The dying public may learn what altitude does to human bodies from a series of experiments performed here by a group of Harvard scientists.

Leadville is 10,200 feet above sea level, the loftiest city in the country.

The altitude here is found to reduce energy by about one fifth. But there is nothing to indicate that a person who flies up to the two-mile level has any less strength when he lands. The experiments show a wonder adaptability of the body, so that it is probable a flier reabsorbs the lost strength as fast as he approaches earth.

The tests are made by Dr. D. E. Dill, head of the fatigue laboratory of Harvard university, with Dr. John H. Talbot, research fellow, H. T. Edwards and S. A. Oberg, chemists, and A. Pappenheimer, Jr., all of the same laboratory.

"The results of the experiments," says Dr. Dill, "indicate that the maximum capacity of man for continued hard labor at this altitude is about four fifths that at sea level. This would indicate that a long distance runner, for example, could maintain four fifths of the speed that he could at sea level."

blood saturation in the lungs is approximately 90 per cent, while at sea level it is only five per cent greater. This is one of the experiments which Dr. Dill says shows the wonderful adaptability of the human body. The pressure of the air here is about two thirds of that at the low altitudes.

The methods the body uses to adapt itself to lofty altitude are deeper breathing and changes in the properties of the blood and in kidney functions.

The tests were made with a stationary bicycle, fitted with a retarding brake drum, capable of forcing the person pedaling to exert various degrees of effort. The equipment for the experiments cost \$3,000.

Rare Old Tapestry Acquired by Boston

BOSTON.— A rare 15th century Gothic tapestry has been acquired by the Boston Museum of Fine Arts by gift from Robert Treat Paine II.

While abroad this summer, Mr. Paine purchased the tapestry from Knole House in Kent, considered the most nearly perfect surviving example of domestic architecture of Tudor, England.

For more than 400 years the great tapestry hung in the chapel of this famous baronial residence, having been presented Knole early in the 16th century by Archbishop Wareham, then its owner.

The tapestry, 29 feet long and 13 feet high, was woven about 1490, possibly for a cathedral. In it are represented six scenes depicting the trials and suffering of Christ at the hands of Pilate, Herod and the populace from 4:30 a. m., to 7:30 a. m., on the day of the crucifixion.

That the tapestry is from the hand of a very great designer is said to be obvious from the drawing and arrangement of the several parts as well as from the splendid unified ensemble. While the artist is as yet unidentified, a clue exists in the similarity of the design of this tapestry and the more fragmentary Passion tapestry of St. Maurice, Angers, which is attributed to the much discussed designer, Jean van Roome, and the no less celebrated Brussels weaver, Pieter van Aelst.

JERUSALEM.— The recent acquisition of 12,000 acres by the Keren Kayemeth, the Zionist Land Purchasing fund, has brought virtually the whole of the coast between Haifa and Jaffa into Jewish hands. This purchase was made possible by the faith and practice of the church of England.
