HENRY J. ZIMMERMAN

Henry J. Zimmerman, one of the oldest cream buyers in this part of the state, and one of O'Neill's oldest residents, passed away at the home of his son Clarence, at 2:45 o'clock Sunday morning, following an illness of several weeks.

For the past year or more, Mr. and Mrs. Zimmerman have been visiting among their children at Spencer, O'Neill, Hastings and Hutchinson, Kansas. When he began to fail in health he was visiting at the home of his son Harold and wife, in Hastings, Nebraska; he wished to spend his latter days in O'Neill; several weeks ago he and Mrs. Zimmerman came to O'Neill and have since been at the C. E. Zimmerman home.

For the past thirty years Mr. Zimmerman has been engaged in the cream buying business in this city; during these years he has made a host of friends throughout the county who will be grieved to hear of his death.

Funeral services were held from the Presbyterian church Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock, conducted by Rev. H. H. Beers; the I. O. O. F. Lodge, of which he was an active member for many years, had charge of the services at the grave in Prospect Hill cemetery where the remains were laid to rest. The pall-bearers were chosen by Mr. Zimmerman the day before he passed away; they were J. C. Harnish, J. H. Meredith, Harry Bowen, W. E. Conklin, W. P. Curtis and J. S. Ennis.

All of the children were in attendance at the funeral.

The following obituary was read by Rev. Beers at the opening of the services:

Henry J. Zimmerman was born on August 15, 1851, at Aldenberg, Germany, and passed away at the home of his son Clarence, Sunday morning November 3rd, at 2:45 a. m., being at the time of his death 78 years, 2 months and 18 days.

He was united in marriage to Miss Catherine Zunkin, of Bremen, Germany, on October 15, 1880; to this union six children were born; one daughter, Mrs. Anton Nemic, of Spencer, Nebraska, and five boys. Dr. Emil H. preceded his father in death October 21, 1918, after a short illness of influenza; Leo H., of Hutchinson, Kansas; Dr. L. John, a dentist in Chicago; Harold E., of Hastings, Nebraska and Clarence E. of O'Neill.

Mr. and Mrs. Zimmerman came to Holt county from Germany in February, 1888; he entered the produce business about 1890 and has resided in O'Neill in that business ever since. He was initiated into the I. O. O. F. lodge December 6, 1893; was elected Noble Grand, May 31, 1899; took the Patriarch Degree of the Encampment April 13, 1894; the Samaritan February 12, 1926; he was also a member of the Modern Woodmen, joining July 18, 1894.

Mr. Zimmerman joined the Presbyterian church in O'Neill May 4th, 1913, on profession of faith.

Herein is given a brief chapter of the life of one of Holt county's pioneers. Doing his full part in the upbuilding of his community, he was content to spend his life here where he found so many friends and neighbors.

It is strange what the introduction of sound can do to the emotions of a movie fan when that sound is the heart throb of a stirring human interest story.

Tiffany Stahl has performed a unique accomplishment in their latest feature production, "Lucky Boy" starring George Jessel. They have combined a powerful photoplay, one fraught with laughter, heartache, romance and adventure, with all the sounds that go along with these emotional experiences in real life. The sound sequences follow straight through the picture. There is heard talking, sobbing, laughter, singing. George Jessel, whose greatest gift is his wit and his ability to portray his emotions through his voice, loses none of the dramatic force that has made him famous on the speaking stage, for his jokes and heart-throbbing songs are faithfully voiced.

The picture is the story of an East Side boy who has melody and rhythm in his soul, but little else to distinguish him from hundreds of boys born in poverty. His mother's love and faith in a son she believes to be different, gives him his first chance at fame and fortune. He fails, and in disgrace goes to California and fights his way painfully to a place in the theatre. It is one of the five songs he sings, "My Mother's Eyes," the theme song of "Lucky Boy," which first brings him notice. He falls in love with a society girl, and courts her against the opposition of her aristocratic family. The solution to all his problems and his rise to fame follow.

One of the most unusual features of the picture from an artistic viewpoint is the photographic and sound reproduction of a Broadway musical

comedy chorus. This is really a masterpiece.

The infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Schultz was taken to the Lynch hospital and operated on Monday. We have not heard how the lit-

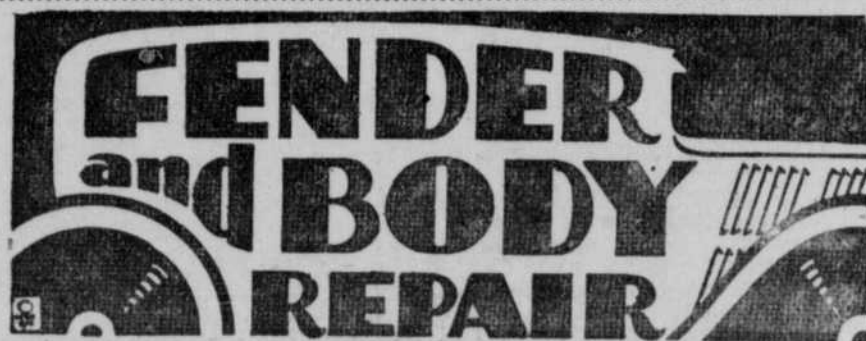
tle one stood the operation.
