GEORGE ROBERG KILLED WHEN CAR STRIKES TRUCK

George Roberg of Page, Nebraska, was instantly killed when his car crashed into the rear end of a truck that was standing in the road two and one-half miles north of Page late Monday afternoon.

Mr. Roberg had been in O'Neill during the afternoon; about five o'clock he started for Page; near the Faulk corner an approaching car with bright lights may have blinded him to such an extent that he failed to see a truck standing in the road directly in his path, and he drove into it; the engine was pushed back almost to the body of the car; the steering wheel was broken off and the post struck him in the breast, breaking four ribs over the heart, the jaw bone and one leg was broken.

Mr. Roberg was about seventy years old; he has resided in Page for many years and is quite well known in O'Neill. He leaves one son, Lyle, who conducts a barber shop in Page. Mrs. Roberg passed away in a Norfolk hospital several months ago.

STATE BOARD CATTLE INCREASE HELD VOID

The State Board of Equalization at their last meeting last July raised the assessed valuation on all cattle in the state ten per cent. Following that meeting, County Clerk E. F. Porter was notified by the board that such raise was effective in Holt county, and instructed him to place the same upon the county tax books. Before doing so, Mr. Porter consulted County Attorney Julius D. Cronin who, after investigation, advised that in his opinion the increase was void for want of notice and hearing and because it amounted to a valuation instead of an equalization, and recommended that the order be resisted in the courts and the increase withheld from the books, pending its determination.

County authorities, feeling that the several precinct assessors had assessed Holt county cattle at their fair market value, and that an increase was not justified, authorized the suit.

Upon the arrival of Mr. Cronin in Lincoln, prepared to start the action in the Supreme Court, he found three other County Attorneys there, prepared to take the same action. To save expense and avoid many suits involving the same thing, it was agreed with representatives of the State Board and the Attorney General's office, that one suit would determine the matter. Stanton county and three large cattle feeders there were chosen as plaintiffs in the action.

Last week the Supreme Court decided that the order increasing the valuation was void. This leaves the assessed value of Holt county cattle at the figure placed upon them by the several precinct assessors, and wipes out the increase ordered by the state board. It is not known just how much of a saving this will mean to Holt county cattlemen.

TURKEY INFORMATION

On Monday of this week I received a complaint that there was no market for Turkeys—at any price. I personally investigated this and found that the marketing time for Thanksgiving Turkeys was from November 4th to November 16th. Turkeys brought in after November 16th are too late to get to the Eastern markets for Thanksgiving. There is a price on Turkeys now, which is very low.

There will be a marketing time for holiday turkeys which is from December 2 to December 12. If the Thanksgiving turkeys are cleaned up on the market, which is very probable, the Christmas market will probably be as high as the Thanksgiving market has been. Don't forget the market dates.
