scientific means, but by crude distillery methods. They further state that the liquor contained fusel oil and other poisonous substances which affected the physical condition, mind and intelligence of Sattler.

After Sattler had consumed a portion of the liquor, the plaintiffs aver, and had become intoxicated, he attempted to drive his automobile on Philip avenue in Norfolk and as a result his car collided with other machines, causing damage to the vehicles.

Sattler, according to the petition, was arrested because of his intoxicated condition and placed in the Norfolk city jail. Because of the arrest, humiliation and disgrace have been brought upon Mary Ann Sattler, the petition states, will remain for time to come, and will last from the time of her infancy, through her school days until she becomes a young woman.

Sattler, the police records show, was fined \$20 for drunkenness and reckless driving by police judge P. M. Barrett. He was fined \$10 by Justice of the Peace Sherman Willey, Norfolk, who further suspended the defendant's auto driver's permit for 6 months.

This case, it is believed, is the first of its kind ever filed in Nebraska. H. F. Barnhart, Norfolk, is the plaintiff's attorney.

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### ALLEGED LIQUOR SALE BASIS OF \$25,000 SUIT

Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sattler, mentioned in the following article, are well known to O'Neill people; Mr. Sattler is a nephew of the late John Carton; Mrs. Sattler will be remembered as Clara Hansen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jens Hansen who resided six miles southeast of O'Neill for several years, but who now reside south of Inman.

Humiliation and disgrace, said by Mrs. Clara Sattler and her infant daughter, Mary Ann Sattler, both of Inman, to have been brought upon them by the alleged sale of liquor to Edwin H. Sattler, husband and father

of the respective plaintiffs, and his subsequent arrest and imprisonment, form the basis of a \$25,000 damage suit filed Saturday in the district court of Madison county, in which Mary LaPrath, Andrew LaPrath and Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Feldhahn, all of Norfolk, are named defendants.

On Tuesday, December 10th, the plaintiffs state in their petition, Edwin Sattler, resident of Inman, came to Norfolk for the purpose of seeing a person, whose name was not stated and who was not in this city at the time of Sattler's arrival, forcing the Inman man to remain in the city longer than he had planned.

Mrs. Sattler and her daughter allege that while Sattler was waiting in Norfolk, the defendants sold to him a quantity of liquor sufficient to cause him to become drunk and "physically unable to navigate and take care of himself."

The liquor sold to Sattler, the plaintiffs state in their petition, was "unfit to be consumed by a human being; was unfit for beverage purposes, and was not manufactured by

### EDUCATIONAL NOTES

The pupils of St. Mary's Academy and of the O'Neill public schools, members of the Junior Red Cross, have made a number of very attractive menu covers and sent them to the American Red Cross headquarters. The Red Cross some time ago requested the schools belonging to the Junior Red Cross to make menu covers to be used for Christmas dinner on all ships of the Atlantic Fleet and in the Veterans Bureau hospitals. The receipt of these covers has been acknowledged by the secretary of the Red Cross, at St. Louis.

The Parent-Teacher Association in Emmet held their monthly meeting on Thursday evening, December 12th Mrs. Guy Cole presided. A fine program was given by the children of the school. Miss Anna Nelson, pastor of the M. E. church, gave a very interesting talk on "Childhood," and County Superintendent Luella A. Parker, talked on the "Value of Parent-Teacher Associations to a Community." After the program a delicious lunch was served.

The last legislature passed a new library law which affects all the school districts in the state of Nebraska. It requires that each district must purchase \$5.00 worth of library books each year per teacher. The following statement is copied from a letter received from the State Superintendent regarding this law:

"The recommendation of this office is for this money to be used in making purchases of books for general reading which will cultivate a taste for good literature and develop permanent interest in reading. The fact that the new law provides for an annual appropriation would seem to indicate that it was the intention of the Legislature for school districts to add to the school collection such single late books and new editions of older books as may be desirable for general reading along the line of the

boys' and girls' enjoyment and interests. In our opinion school equipment includes encyclopedias, dictionaries, and other reference books including sets of the works of one author, but a real school library cannot be built of books of this character even though they may be indispensable to the teacher. A live, up to date collection of single volumes is a requisite for good school libraries."

I would like to urge each school district that has not already bought their library books to do so as soon as possible so that the children may have the benefit of them during the school year.

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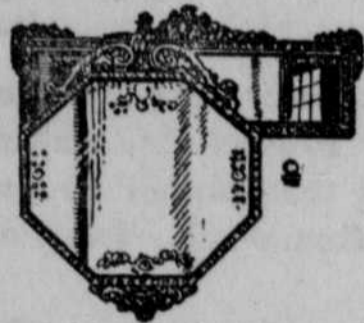
