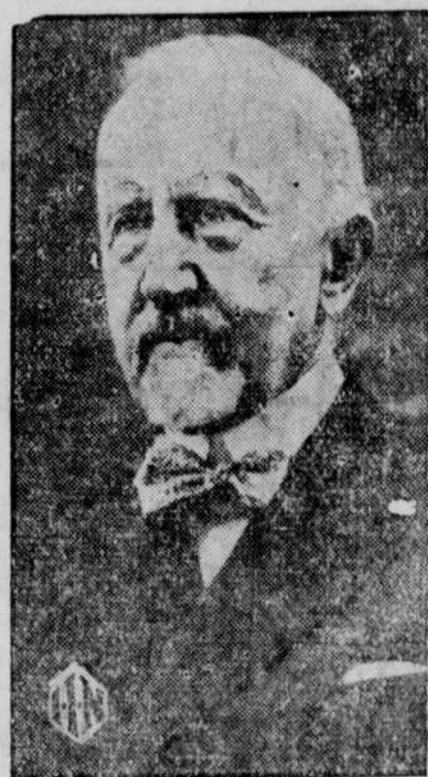
Hero of the Sea Saves Crew from Death
