EDUCATIONAL NOTES

There seems to be an impression in the minds of some of the teachers in the county that substitute work in rural schools may be done by teachers without certificates. Several teachers finding it necessary to be absent from the school on account of illness or otherwise, have been placing substitutes in their schools who do not have a valid certificate, without consulting the County Superintendent. This has caused rather serious trouble in two cases. At no time is it lawful for anyone without a valid certificate to draw money for teaching. There are cases where it might be advisable to place someone of this kind in a school for a short time when a qualified teacher is not available but this should not be made a practice. If a teacher finds that she must be absent from school for a time she should consult her district board at once. If they do not think best to close the school for this period, the teacher with the consent of the board may place a substitute teacher with a valid certificate in her school. If you do not know of one, please consult me at once. We have several teachers who are available

for substitute work on short notice. To hire a teacher who does not have a certificate as a substitute, even for a short time may cause the district to lose their state apportionment for the year since this law states that in order to be eligible for state apportionment, school must be in session the required length of time with a qualified teacher.

The first Eighth grade examination will be given on Friday, January 24th in the large towns, Amelia and Scottville District No. 38. Only four subjects, Reading, Grammar, Mental Arithmetic and Spelling, will be offered at this time. This examination is for eighth graders only.

The next State Teacher's examinations will be given on January 18th, at Atkinson, Ewing and O'Neill.
