If Z bids one no trump with this hand, his chances of going game are very slight. He has only one stopper in three suits; and the fourth suit, hearts, is far from being set up. On the other hand, a bid of one heart offers much better chance for game. Such a bid eliminates the chance of a long suit making; and two or three tricks in the partner's hand make game very possi-ble. Game also is possible even though artner holds only two or three hearts; therefore the proper bid with Z's hand undoubtedly is one heart.
