HOLT COUNTY STUDENTS AT STATE UNIVERSITY

Holt County has a representation of twenty-six students at the University of Nebraska this year—the same number that was enrolled from the county last year. Atkinson boasts of the largest delegation sent by any of the towns, sending a total of seven students. Dustin and Page each claim a single student, Chambers and Joy two each; Ewing three, and Stuart and O'Neill rival each other for second place, each sending five.

Out of the twenty-six students enrolled, eleven are also engaged in part-time employment, earning a portion of their funds for obtaining a college education. The students are fairly evenly divided according to year and rank in the University, with two graduate students, three seniors, seven juniors, five sophomores and nine freshmen.

O'Neill, with an enrollment of five students, has a representative in each class. Marguerite Welsh, a senior in the Teacher's College, is majoring in Spanish. She belongs to and is taking an active part in both the French and Spanish Clubs on the campus, and plays in the Spanish orchestra.

Carol Thelma Simonsen, a junior in the Teacher's College, is taking a major in Zoology. She is also working along with her regular college courses. Burt Hubbard, a junior in the University studying medicine, is a member of Omega Beta Pi, professional pre-medical fraternity on the campus.

Fred Warner, who is a sophomore

in the College of Dentistry, is a member of Delta Sigma Delta, professional dental group. He also has part-time employment. James C. Parker, a freshman in the College of Engineering, is another of the students who is carrying a heavy schedule of work both in and outside of school.

There is an unusual feature of the group of young Cornhuskers from Atkinson. They make up the largest group, all boys, and with a single exception reside in the same home in Lincoln. Four of them have outside employment.

Hughes Keizer, a senior in the Teacher's College, is taking a major in economics. Robert Evans, a senior in the College of Business Administration, is president of his fraternity, Sigma Phi Sigma. Raymond Collins, a junior in the Teacher's College, is taking a major in science. He has been a member of the A Capello choir for the last two years.

Clarence F. Silverstrand is a junior in the College of Business Administration, and in addition is one of the high ranking students scholastically in the college class. Henry L. Seger, a sophomore in the Teacher's College is doing part-time work and is interested in athletics. In 1929, he won the one-half mile, one mile and the two-mile race in the freshman relay meet. Kenneth Schultz is a sophomore in the College of Pharmacy. Tabor Kelly is a freshman in the College of Arts and Sciences and the school of fine arts and is taking a major in music.

Of the other Holt county towns represented at the University, Stuart

has the next highest enrollment. The following students are registered: Marvin R. Davis, a junior in the Teacher's College; Phyllis Rhodes, and secretary of Kappa Epsilon sorority, pharmaceutical professional junior in the College of Pharmacy; William Kaplan, freshman in the College of Engineering; Stewart Farner, a freshman in the Teacher's College and a member of Sigma Phi Sigma fraternity.

Ewing is next in rank with the following three students: Wilda L. Dierks, who is enrolled in the College of Agriculture and is a member of Phi Mu sorority; Stuart Hales in the College of Arts and Sciences and Russell Wiener, an Arts college student and a member of Sigma Nu fraternity.

James and Rebecca Robertson represent Joy on the Cornhusker campus. James is a sophomore in the College of Business Administration and Rebecca is a first-year student in the Teacher's College.
