O'NEILL DISTRICT HONORS BISHOP JOSEPH F. RUMMEL

A gathering of one hundred and seven men honored Bishop Joseph F. Rummel at a dinner at the Knights of Columbus hall last Tuesday when they gathered to assist in the dio-cesan extension; \$14,150 was subscribed to the Bishop's program. The dinner in this city was the fifth of a series of six being conducted in the Omaha diocese.

Bishop Rummel and Father John F. White of New York were the principal speakers at a series of six din-Norfolk during the past two weeks.

The West Point district subscribed \$19,100; Hartington \$16,500; Omaha \$202,555, Columbus \$23,383, O'Neill \$14,150, and Norfolk \$17,625. The total amount subscribed was more than

\$300,000.00. The goal of the campaign includes the raising of sufficient money to rebuild St. James Orphanage, construct an Old Folks Home, and increase the hospital and charitable facilities of the diocese. While no definite amount has been set, Bishop Rummel indicated in his remarks that he hoped the diocese would subscribe between Nu Fu Club la \$750,000 and a million dollars for this much needed work.


