# New Common Battery Equipment Will be Placed in Operation SATURDAY

The new common battery telephone equipment at O'Neill will be placed in service March 15th. As soon as possible after the new equipment is placed in service, the operator will call you to inform you that common battery service is now available.

When placing calls it is only necessary to lift the receiver to signal the operator. Restoring the receiver to the heok after your conversation is ended signals the operator that you are through talking.

The magneto telephones soon will be replaced with new instruments of the common battery type. But your magneto telephones will furnish common battery service until they are replaced.
