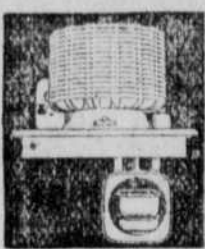

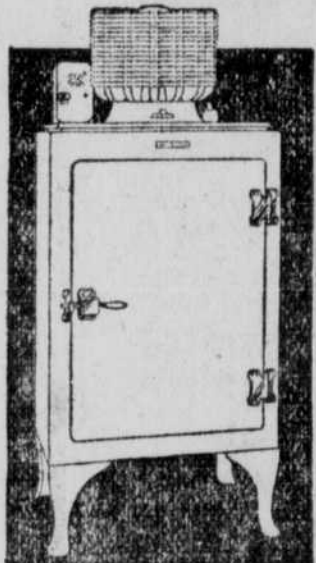

**OBITUARY**

Friends in Inman were grieved to hear of the death of Mrs. Frank McDermott, of Ewing, Friday morning. Mr. and Mrs. McDermott have lived in Inman for many years, but in the fall of 1928 had moved to Ewing to be near their daughters.

Mary Jane Thompson was born at Butlerville, Illinois, August 23, 1849, and passed away at Ewing, Nebraska, March 14, 1930, at the age of 80 years, 6 months and 21 days.

On June 3, 1875, she was united in marriage to Franklin McDermott, at Butlerville. To this union seven children were born; two sons, Lewis and Chester, have preceded their mother in death. During the years of their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. McDermott moved to California, residing at Eureka for three years. They then returned to the old home in Illinois for a stay of seven years, coming to Nebraska in 1885. They took up a homestead 10 miles north of Page, where they lived for 18 months; from there they moved to O'Neill and resided there for three years. In 1890 they came to Inman, purchasing land one half mile south of town, this being their home for forty years. In the fall of 1928, being in very poor health, they decided to move to Ewing, to be near their daughters during their last years.

Mrs. McDermott leaves to mourn her departure, her aged husband; one son, Ben, of Ewing; four daughters, Mrs. A. E. Edwards, of Berkeley, California; Mrs. W. S. Frisbie, of Washington, D. C.; Mrs. J. B. Wood and Mrs. Garry Benson, of Ewing; one sister, Mrs. Belle Campbell, of Astoria, Illinois, and six grand-children.

Funeral services were held at the Methodist church in Inman, Sunday afternoon the Rev. R. Poe officiating. Burial was in the Inman cemetery.

Two daughters, Mrs. Edwards and Mrs. Frisbie, were unable to come to the funeral.

**DISTRICT COURT IN SESSION; TWO CASES HAVE BEEN TRIED**

The first case to be called in District Court which began last Monday, was the insurance case of Jesse F. Salyars vs. The State Farmer's Insurance Company, where Mr. Salyars sought to collect \$1,750 and interest on an insurance policy as a result of the loss of a barn, hoghouse and granary, on the night of March 17, 1928. The Insurance Company had been refusing to pay the loss, contending that the policy had been secured by misrepresentation. The jury went out on the case at 5:30 in the evening; at 5:20 the following morning they returned a sealed ver-

dict, which found for the plaintiff in the sum of \$1,944.25, which was the full amount sued for. M. F. Harrington and George M. Harrington were attorneys for the plaintiff; Arthur F. Mullen and W. J. Hammond were attorneys for the Insurance Company.

The case of Robert J. McAllister vs. George Morstorf was called up for trial Thursday. Jury was impaneled and sworn, opening statements made and trial commenced. Suit was over a claimed commission for the sale of a Holt county ranch. The plaintiff on direct examination claimed that in the latter part of February or the forepart of March, 1928, he had released a party by the name of Broughton from any liability for the claimed commission and was holding the defendant, Morstorf, for the payment of the commission. Defense counsel had plaintiff identify a letter he had written to the defendant in December, 1928, in which the plaintiff was still claiming the commission was due from Broughton. Thereupon plaintiff's counsel moved for a dismissal of the case without prejudice. The court granted the motion and the jury was dismissed. M. F. Harrington and Julius D. Cronin were attorneys for plaintiff and J. J. Harrington was attorney for the defendant.

The case of the State of Nebraska vs. David M. Armstrong was called up for trial Wednesday. The information contained three counts, possession of a still, possession of mash and possession of whiskey. The defense was that the defendant was away from home for some time prior to the raid, and that at the time the defendant left home there was not, and never had been up to that time, any still, mash or whiskey on the premises. The jury returned a verdict of guilty on the two counts of possession of the still and mash, and not guilty on the charge of possession of the whiskey. County Attorney Julius D. Cronin, attorney for the state and M. F. Harrington and George M. Harrington attorneys for the defendant.
