PLAN DAM FOR PLATTE RIVER

Preliminary Survey Contemplates Impounding Much Water

Lincoln, Neb.—(UP)—Preliminary surveys will be made this weekend in the vicinity of North Platte, on the Platte and Birdwood rivers, for sites for dam and storage reservoir, by the state water resource survey, it is announced.

Prof. Clark Mickey of the University of Nebraska, Robert W. Willis, chief of the Nebraska bureau of irrigation and drainage, and C. J. McNamara, consulting civil engineer of North Platte, will make the surveys.

The party will seek to determine the location of a diversion dam on the Platte, between the confluence of the north and south forks and Brady island. This location will be approximately four miles east of North Platte, Professor Mickey said.

In the Birdwood creek canyon about 25 miles northwest of North Platte, site will be chosen for studies and surveys necessary in determining design and construction cost of a large earthen dam, proposed to create a huge reservoir with 60,000 to 70,000 acre-feet capacity. The impounded water is to be used by the areas under the ditches below the reservoir.

Professor Mickey states that the plan is to build these two projects by co-operative agreement between all irrigation projects east of North Platte and on both sides of the river. Sites of three dams and estimated cost will be determined and presented to each of the co-operating irrigation districts below this project.

No special section of the valley is to be benefitted from the impounded waters, but it is expected that the water will be used to supplement the inadequate supply during the dry season for all co-operating districts.

FOUNDLING TO VISIT PARENTS

Hartington, Neb.—(Special)—Doll Worthman, who recently discovered that his real parents are alive and living at Brooklyn, N. Y., has gone to the eastern metropolis where he will be reunited with his parents. He was taken from an orphanage by Mr. and Mrs. Henry Worthman, Sr., of East Bow and has made his home with them the last 18 years.

Cecil's story is a dramatic one which had its inception almost 19 years ago, when he was placed temporarily in an orphanage while his mother was ill and his father unable to care for him. By an error the child was sent west and the Cedar county people adopted him. The orphanage officials, as is their custom, were sworn to secrecy to his whereabouts.

Last Thanksgiving the foster mother wrote the orphanage asking if the real parents wanted their son and immediately Mr. and Mrs. Earl Van Vlieth of Brooklyn began to send long distance telephone calls, telegrams and letters planning a reunion with their long lost son.

RECONSIDER GAS FRANCHISE ELECTION PLAN

Norfolk, Neb.—(Special)—When the Norfolk city council meets next Monday night an effort will be made to reconsider the council's action in calling a special election for May 13 to give the Utilities Natural Gas company a 25-year franchise to distribute natural gas in Norfolk.

This movement was seen following the announcement Tuesday that the company just recently filed incorporation papers at Lincoln. One local lawyer declares that he will offer a counter proposition for natural gas to the council and that he will offer lower rates than those offered by the newly incorporated concern.

MODERN BANKING HOUSE WILL BE ERECTED

Norfolk, Neb.—(Special)—Directors of the Nebraska State bank which was damaged by fire recently decided to raze the old building and now are starting the construction of a modern fire-proof bank building which will be located on the city's principal business intersection. The building now being torn down is an old landmark being constructed in 1884.

BODIES OF TWO CROSSING VICTIMS TO OMAHA

Omaha, Neb.—(UP)—Mrs. Catherine Dofner and her 4-year-old daughter were among victims of the Isleta, N. M., bus-train collision in which 17 were killed Friday, relatives here have been informed. Mrs. Dofner was enroute from California to visit her mother here. The bodies probably will be brought here for burial.

PREPARE TO PAVE SOUTH OF NORFOLK

Norfolk, Neb.—(Special)—Three miles of the Meridian highway just south of Norfolk will be paved early this year. The South Thirteenth street part of the road is blocked now by graders preparing for the paving. The detour on the Columbus-Norfolk road out of Norfolk is on South First street for distance of about two miles. The new paving will connect with three miles of paving which was completed late last year.

NOT DISCOURAGED BY FALL OF 600 FEET

Lincoln, Neb.—(UP)—It takes more than a drop of 600 feet from the skies in his plane to discourage Charles Smith, 23 years old, student pilot, from giving up his ambition to fly. Partly recovering in the hospital from the effects of having a few teeth knocked out, one shoulder badly wrenched and suffering a slight concussion of the brain, he asked his nurse to get his aviation books so that he could study them and correct the fault that resulted in his plane crashing to earth here Sunday.

QUICK WORK ON GAS FRANCHISE

Citizens of Norfolk Inclined to Be Skeptical About the Proposition

Norfolk, Neb.—(Special)—The Norfolk city council is being criticized for breaking all Norfolk council records in passing an ordinance for a natural gas franchise and, after a week of investigation, citizens continue to be in ignorance as to what individuals or corporation wants the franchise.

The council completed the passing of an ordinance in one night, calling for a special election, May 13, to give the Utilities Natural Gas company of Nebraska a 25-year franchise to furnish natural gas to Norfolk. When asked who this company is several councilmen declare they don't know and some of them say they think it is the company that is now building a natural gas line into Kearney and proposes one into Sioux City.

The Norfolk Chamber of Commerce directors held a special meeting and asked H. E. Siman, a Wayne lawyer, who presented the franchise ordinance to the city council, to come to Norfolk and explain more about the company and the nature behind the franchise. So far as known there are no companies contemplating the building of a natural gas line to Norfolk at this time, hence the inquiry by the Chamber of Commerce directors.

Officers of the Iowa-Nebraska Light company and the Central West Public Service company which has the local artificial gas franchise, say they are not behind the natural gas franchise movement and are as interested in finding out who wants it as are many of the citizens of Norfolk.

There have been some intimations that within a week or two a full explanation about the company will be made to the citizens. So far as could be learned at the state capitol the Utilities Natural Gas company is not incorporated in Nebraska.

In the meantime City Clerk Glenn Briggs is advertising the special franchise election and placards regarding the coming election are being circulated.

THURSTON'S CHAMP SPELLER CHOSEN SATURDAY

Pender, Neb.—Thurston county spelling contest were held in the high school here Saturday. Gerald Holt, 12 years old, of district No. 10, rural school, emerged winner. Seventeen students participated.

Holt won in the finals from Mary King, 12 years old, of district No. 38, rural school, winner of the oral contest. The boy won in written competition. The finals also were written. Second place winners in the written and oral contests, respectively, were: Naomi Freeman, 14 years old, of district No. 16, Macy school, and Wilma Krusemark, 11 years old, of district No. 5 rural school.

The Thurston county champion will participate in the state spelling bee at Omaha. Both he and the King girl will enter the interstate contest at Council Bluffs next Friday. Second place winners will participate in the state contest at Lincoln, August 30.

WOMAN MUST DO TIME IN STATE PRISON

Lincoln, Neb.—Mrs. Cornelia Norton, Levington, must spend one to two years in prison, as a result of the affirmation by the supreme court of her conviction for receiving stolen hogs.

Mrs. Norton's conviction was obtained on the testimony of her nephew, T. M. Hess, now serving time for the theft. The hogs were taken from W. T. Wells, father-in-law of Hess. Hess said he intended to steal chickens while his father-in-law was absent, but they made so much noise he took hogs instead.

The scheme was concocted in the Norton home, Hess claimed. The hogs were sold as belonging to Mrs. Norton. She later claimed that she supposed they were some of hers.

ENDS OWN LIFE BY PLUNGING INTO BARREL

Craig, Neb.—(Special)—Clarence Cook, 25 years old, took his own life by drowning in a barrel of water in the hog house at the Gilbert Isaacson farm, where he had been working. The barrel was sunk in the ground. The body was sent to Chanute, Kan., where his mother and brothers live. No reason for the act except temporary aberration is known.

LIONS' STATE MEET TO BE HELD AT NORFOLK

Norfolk, Neb.—(Special)—The state convention of Nebraska Lion clubs will be held in Norfolk, May 7 and 8 and George Phelps, state convention secretary, reports that more than 500 visitors will be here. A dozen or more new clubs have been organized in northern Nebraska during the last two months and northern Nebraska clubs are joining to make the state convention the biggest in the history of the organization. Governor Weaven has accepted an invitation to be one of the speakers.

POLITICAL POT AT HIGH HEAT

Omaha in Great Turmoil Over Dismissal of Two Officers

Omaha, Neb.—(UP)—Political watching with interest amazement of Police Commissioner Henry W. Dunn in dismissing two department heads under fire in the height of an election campaign.

It was said to be one of the few instances in Nebraska political history where such action was taken. Opinion is divided as to whether it will be harmful or beneficial to the Dahlman administration slate, several members of which are fighting desperately for re-election.

The officers, "Raiding Bob" Samardick and Chief of Detective Ben Danbaum were highly praised by Dunn after he had asked for and accepted their resignations. Dunn frankly stated to newspapermen that he dismissed them in an effort to save his own job, he being now man among the seven candidates.

It was generally understood that a powerful clique of South Omaha bootleggers were responsible for Samardick's removal. The "liberal" element was amazed when Dunn appointed Samardick last December and it is believed they took their revenge by knitting Dunn in the primary last week.

Danbaum, on the other hand, was well liked by the liberal element from attorneys and newspaper men who claimed to have often been insulted and ordered from the detective chief's office. Others who came in contact with him had complained of his "hard-boiled" tactics.

While other members of the city hall slate declared Dunn acted on his own initiative both in hiring Samardick and in dismissing him and Danbaum, the entire slate is expected to suffer or benefit with him because of the move. The seven candidates opposed to the city hall crowd are expected to take full advantage of the situation in campaign speeches.

A record-breaking vote is expected at the election May 6 because of the heat added to the campaign by the dismissals. Primary ballots totaled 51,236. Election Commissioner H. H. Huggins said. He predicted election vote in excess of 75,000.

TELLS HOW GIRL IS SAVED FROM WEAK MIND

Lincoln, Neb.—(UP)—The story of how a surgical operation saved a 14-year-old Plattsmouth girl from going to the hospital for feeble-minded at Beatrice is told by E. M. Pollard, secretary of the department of public welfare.

Up until four years ago, the girl was mentally normal, and then following a case of sleeping sickness, she was unable to make progress in her school work, according to a report made to Pollard by County Superintendent Alpha C. Peterson. Teachers were unable to do anything with her and it was urged that she be sent to the Beatrice hospital.

Pollard asked Dr. K. S. J. Hohlen, of Lincoln, who had studied in Vienna, to examine the girl, and photographs of her brain showed the brain was clear.

An examination then revealed that her sinuses were choked and her adenoids were large. Two operations removed this trouble and the girl has returned to her school rooms, normal once again.

TO BE TRIED IN FEDERAL COURT FOR MURDER

Chadron, Neb.—(UP)—Francisco Unzueta must go to trial in federal, instead of state court, in connection with the murder of Omer Robertson, near Fort Robinson, Neb., the federal supreme court at Washington has decreed.

Robertson was murdered on a North Western freight train July 24, 1929, as it crossed the military reservation, and the federal authorities claimed they had jurisdiction in the case. Attorneys for Unzueta claimed the murder was committed on a railroad right of way over a portion of the military reservation that had been abandoned.

Federal Judge J. W. Woodrough of Omaha, had decided that the state of Nebraska had jurisdiction in the matter, but Attorney General Mitchell notified United States District Attorney Kinsler to file an appeal.

According to local officers, Unzueta confessed to the murder, declaring he wrested a gun from Robertson and shot him as the latter attempted to hold up Unzueta and several Mexican companions.

SUCCEEDS MCKELVIE AS BOY SCOUT PRESIDENT

Lincoln, Neb.—(UP)—L. W. Baldwin of St. Louis, president of the Missouri Pacific railroad, succeeded Samuel R. McKelvie yesterday as regional chairman of the Boy Scouts of America, Regional Executive Fred G. Davies announced.

Region 8, over which Baldwin will have jurisdiction, consists of Nebraska, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming and Iowa. Baldwin was appointed by President Walter W. Head, of the national organization, and by Mortimer L. Schiff, head of the national field committee.

McKelvie, who had been regional chairman for four years, was forced to resign on account of his many duties with the Federal Farm board.
