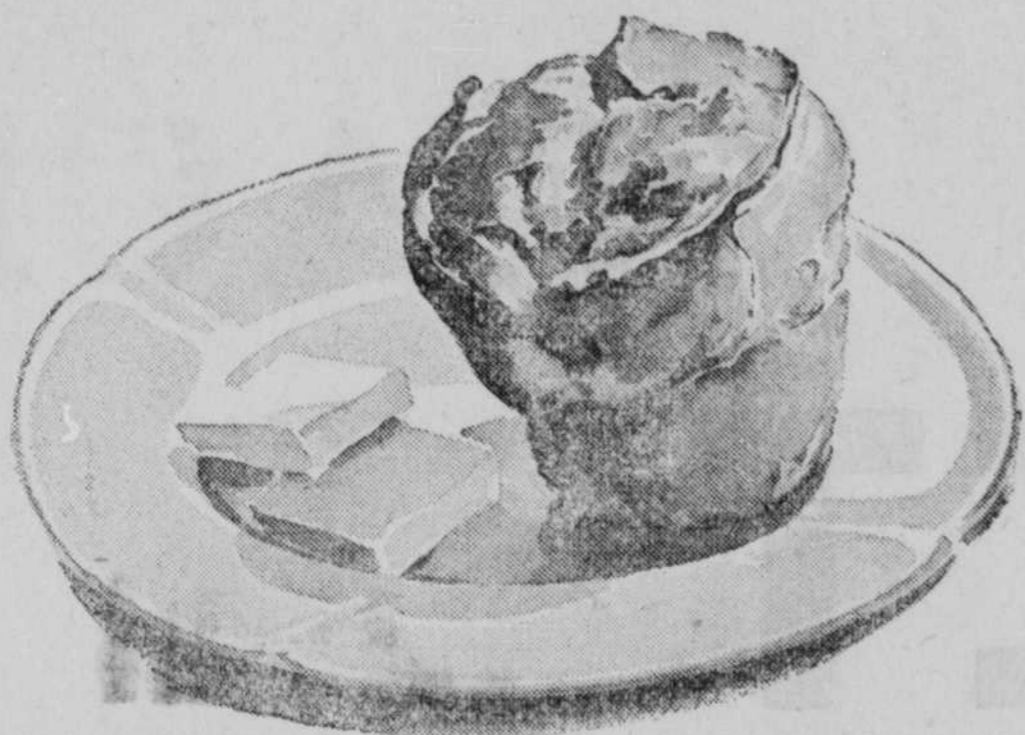


The popover has just popped over

The section of the country northwest of the town was called Blizzardville and there was a bunch of youngsters who always had a good time, and so they composed the song which I heard once or twice when a kid, but it all came back to me, and I know there are some who will be glad to read it.

THE BLIZZARDVILLE BOYS

There is Lord Fitzgerald and Big Tony Murry, Tade Welsh and Jim Connolly and Red-headed Pete; There is McGreevy the fiddler, who is always willing, To play us a "hoe-down" whenever we meet. There is slim Anabella so neat and so trim, There is Miss Julia Welsh, the young graduate; There is Mary Fitzgerald and Big Connolly's daughter, They are elegant people, they dress up so neat.

Chorus: We are boys to have fun and hear eloquence, Dancing and singing and all other joys;

There is ruction, destruction, divilment, devilmint, Who can compare with the Blizzardville boys.

There is Miss Welsh, I'm sure neither bashful nor shy, To wink at the boys as they're passing by;

But look out for the "Peeler" for he's an old squealer, I tell you, beware or he'll blacken your eye.

There is Madden, McCafferty and Young Eddie Gallagher, And his big brother Dan, gone away to the hill;

They are heavy and able, not slack at the table, And they are the boys that can handle their drills.

The song was never published but it was quite a hit at the time and was sung to the music of some familiar tune.

The Lord Edward Fitzgerald was none other than Jim Fitzgerald, who when feeling in his cups, claimed to be the great Lord Edward. Red-headed Pete was Pete Reddy, a friend of the Reddy's and Peeler was his title in Ireland, as he was a policeman there. Later he taught school in his district, No. 8, and many a good one was pulled off on him. Miss Julia Welsh, daughter of Tom Welsh, was a great favorite and had graduated early in a school in Pennsylvania. She is now living in Casper, Wyoming and is Mrs. Walter O'Malley. Mary Fitzgerald was a sister of "Lord Edward." Big Connolly's daughter was a sister to the deputy sheriff who was wounded when sheriff Kearns was killed. Madden and Murry were two of the celebrated Christian Brothers who batched together.

This crowd held together for some time; the remnant was connected with a killing and murder, which finally broke up the Blizzardville Boys.

CHEVROLET SIX WINS SENSATIONAL ECONOMY TEST

Again the new Chevrolet—a six—has proved itself as economical to run as any car you can buy, regardless of the number of cylinders.

In a recent 200-mile economy test, held under the observation of the American Automobile Association, a 1930 Chevrolet six cylinder coach, driven by Mrs. Paul A. Lawrence of Los Angeles, California, won first place. It averaged better than 20 miles to the gallon of gasoline. At the finish the oil level in the crankcase was the same as at the start. And the conditions under which the victory was won make Chevrolet's record even more amazing.

The 200-mile course followed a winding route, rising from sea level to an elevation of 6,000 feet. Crowded city traffic, steep mountain grades and soft, sandy stretches—road conditions that usually require more than average fuel consumption—all were encountered in the run. And the victorious Chevrolet not only took first place in its class but won the sweepstakes for all classes as well.

The test was made with four passengers besides the driver. The total weight of car and passengers being 3,580 pounds.

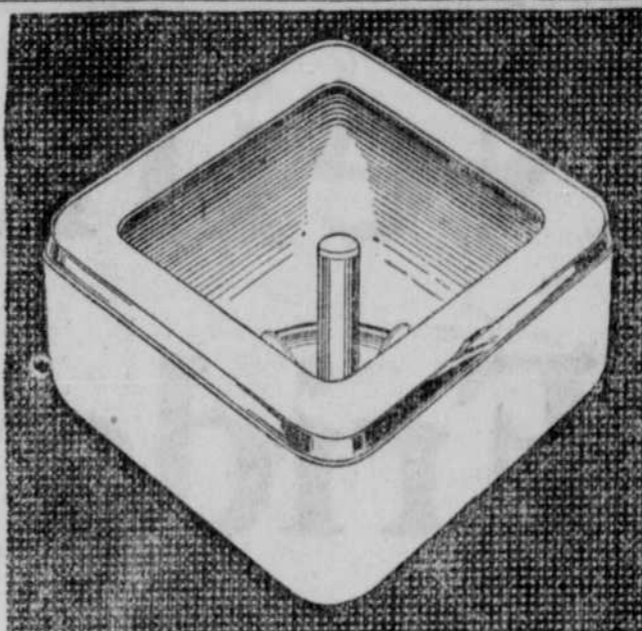

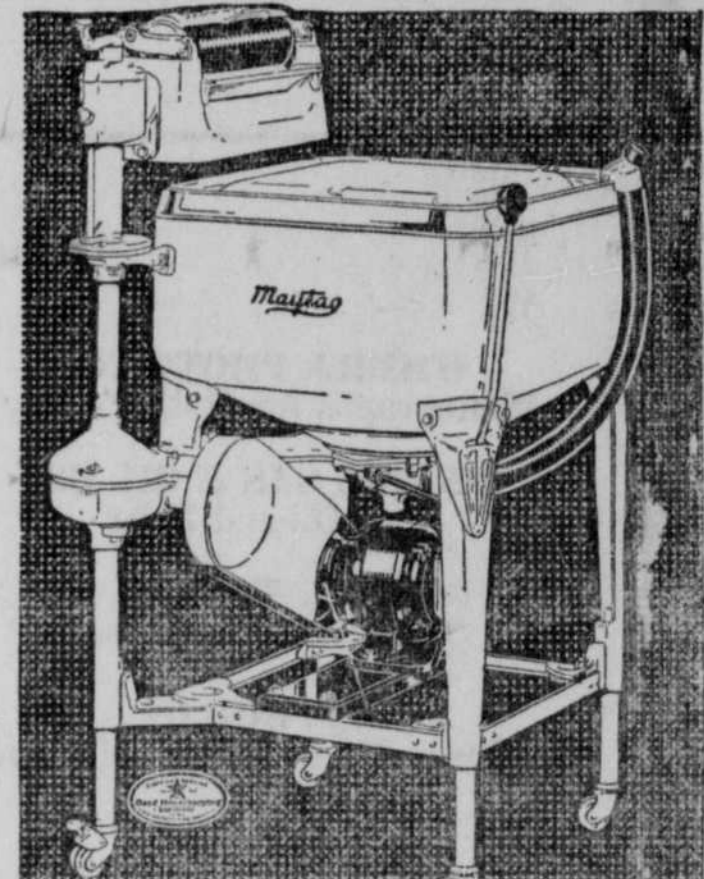
