The circus will bring 28 elephants, camels and ostriches by the family, zebras and llamas that draw jeweled floats in the opening pageant, 200 trained horses, 56 of them in one act, more than 300 men and women performers and no end of menagerie animals.

Having five rings is a new idea. That's so five troops of liberty horses can be put through their stunts at once. Same way with the elephants—five herds in a clatter.

"This season's big top is the largest ever constructed," one of the advance agents said. "It seats an army of people and 15,000 can be taken care of nicely. The hippodrome track had to be made wider to accommodate the high-jumping horse numbers, and the added pageant features of Noah and the Ark. Now that we erect five rings down the center of the tent, there is just as much show at the ends as there is near the center of the main tent."

Performances are scheduled for two for the afternoon and eight for the night show. Doors will open an hour earlier so that all may pay a lieasurely visit to the menagerie.

Anna Marjorie Katzenberger passed away at the University hospital in Omaha, April 26th, where she had been taken for treatment soon after she was seriously burned following an explosion of kerosene in a cook stove at her home south of Bartlett, Nebraska, on April 3rd, at the age of 19 years, 2 months and 19 days.

The deceased was born February 7, 1911, at Plainview, Nebraska, where she resided until at the age of six years, when she came with her parents to O'Neill, Nebraska; she made her home here until her marriage to Lloyd E. McLain, of Bartlett, Nebraska, on December 28, 1927; she and her husband have made their home south of Bartlett since that time. One child was born to this union, Dean Lloyd, who with his father survives.

Short funeral services were held at Bartlett and again after the remains were taken to Plainview, Nebraska, where burial was made on April 29.

Besides her husband and baby she leaves her father and mother Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Katzenberger of Woodbine Iowa; five sisters and three brothers; Mrs. E. E. Summers, Page; Mrs. Myron Peterson, Mrs. Harry Steppins, Woodbine, Iowa; Lyle, Robert, Harold, Maxiam and Delorze, all at home; Grandma and Grandpa Cleveland, besides a host of other relatives and friends.

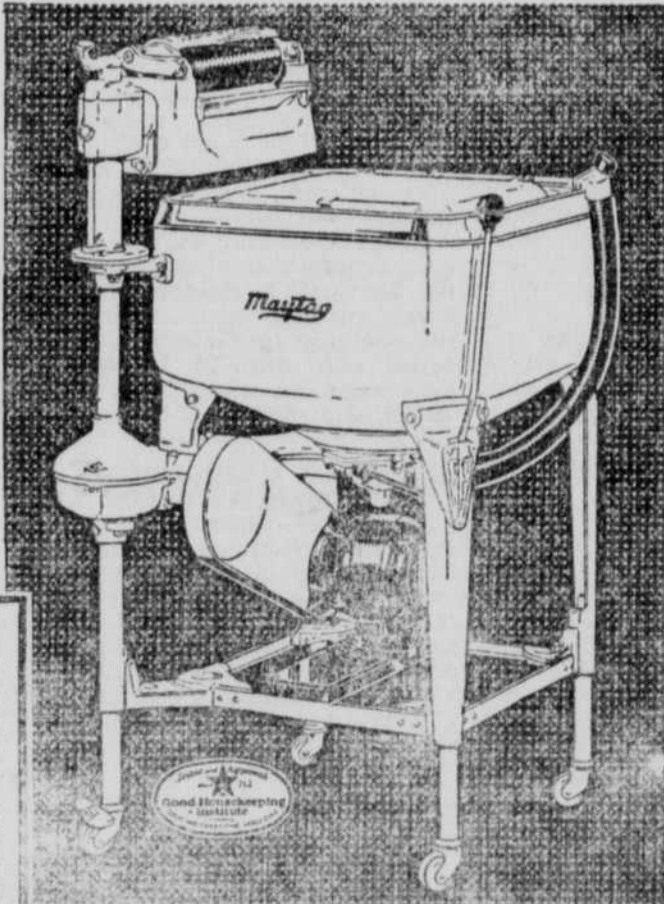
