## NEW HARVESTING MACHINE AND TARIFF MAY MOVE WORLD SUGAR BOWL TO U. S.

Washington—The increased duty congress voted on Cuban raw sugar and the advent of a sugar cane harvester has spurred interest in the northern everglades of Florida as a potential new "sugar bowl" of the world.

The department of agriculture says there are thousands of acres of rich muck soil south of Lake Okeechobee adapted to the production of cane.

**2,000,000 Tons Annually**  
It has been estimated that southern Florida can produce 2,000,000 tons of sugar annually, using the mosaic-resistant P. O. J. varieties now common to Louisiana and other southern sugar cane areas.

This country produces only about 20 per cent of the sugar it consumes and only about 2 1/2 per cent of the 20 is cane sugar. Sugar beets supply the remainder.

Cuba is the principal contributor of the 5,500,000 tons of cane sugar imported annually and the major competitor of domestic producers.

**New Harvester Perfected**  
Coincidentally with the Senate's proposal for a 2-cents-a-pound duty on Cuban raw in the pending tariff bill, a new cane harvester has come into use which is expected to reduce the labor costs that long have given the industry in America a decided disadvantage in competition with cheap-labor sugar from foreign sources.

The machine is the invention of C. G. Muench, an engineer of St. Paul, Minn. In tests it cut 20 tons of cane an hour.

By the hand harvesting method it takes one man a full day to cut two and one-half tons. It is estimated the machine will do in a day the work of 150 men. The sugar cane industry has long been seeking a machine that would successfully cut, strip, top and clean cane. The Muench machine does all in one operation. Muench expects improvements to raise the machine's capacity to 40 tons an hour and believes it will revolutionize the sugar cane industry.

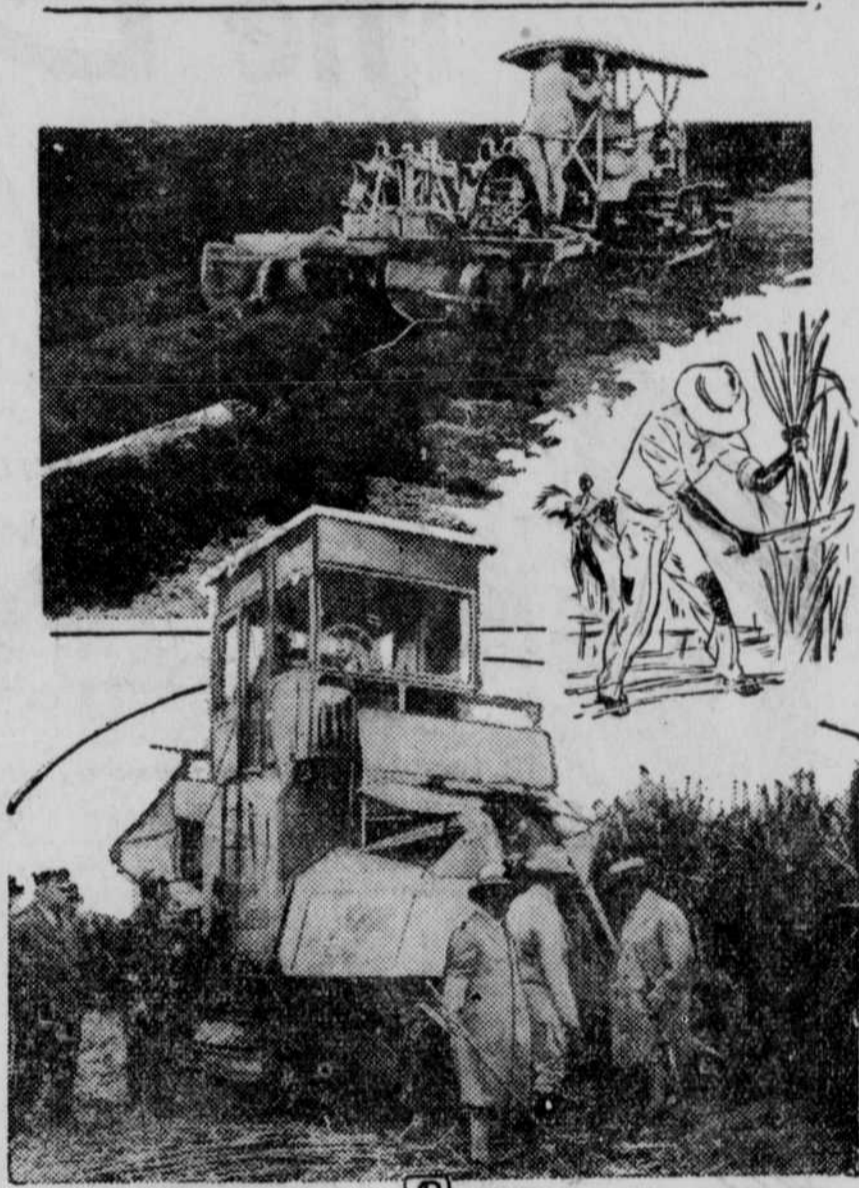

### A No-Credit Town.

The Nebraska town of Bloomfield, whose population was 1,431 in 1920, has an organization of retail merchants who have demanded cash for purchases during the last two years. There has been no credit given there since 1928. Any merchant violating the agreement is subject to a fine of \$100. But there has been no occasion for one. The plan originated in 1928 when collections were desperately slow. Mr. R. D. Wilson, president of the town's retailers' organization, in a recent report says: "It has kept customers out of debt for two years. Under no circum-

stances would we go back to the old credit system. Moreover, customers do not send out for their needs now. They buy them from local merchants.

We dare say they get their necessities cheaper than they did under the credit system, and that the community is happier without monthly bills to pay. There is something about "paying as you go" that promotes thrift. We would like to know if there have been any failures among these heroic merchants, and how their profits compare with those under the credit system. Merchants who give credits must charge their losses to those who pay; that

is, mark up their goods to cover what they lose from deadbeats. This is particularly true in small towns, where there is no credit man but the owner. When the owner of the old country store in which we worked quit business, he was collecting old bills for 10 years. And credits wreck many a retailer.

### Bird Sanctuaries Dot

**Coast of New Zealand**  
Several islands along the coast of New Zealand have been set aside as sanctuaries for the native birds which are becoming scarce on the mainland.

One of these is Little Barrier Island, a steep, wooded islet about 50 miles from Auckland. Ships of all kinds pass within a few miles of it on their way to and from Auckland, but no one is allowed to land without permission of the government, and except for the caretaker, who keeps watch for possible marauders, there are no human beings on the island.

Near Wellington is Kapiti Island, big and hilly, once the stronghold of Maori chiefs; it is now the equally well-defended citadel of the native birds.

### Hairless Rabbits

Russian hairless rabbits may yet appear on the scene, pursued by the already familiar—perhaps too familiar—Mexican hairless dogs. In the Journal of Heredity, D. A. Koslovsky of the State Institute for Experimental Veterinary Medicine of Russia tells of several hairless young rabbits that appeared among normal litters in hutches of his experimental animals. Some of them were partly clothed, having hair on their noses, ears, shoulder blades and other bits of their anatomy. So far, however, all the hairless young ones born have died without issue. The breed is therefore not established, and may be difficult to make a permanent one, even if it is considered desirable to do so.
