The most favorable distribution of the beets in the field is as follows: If planted in 18-inch rows, by thinning them thirteen inches apart, or, if planted in 20-inch rows, by thinwill give either case a stand, or

We, of course, cannot advise or recommend an arbitrary distance between beets, as much depends upon the productiveness of the land and also on the evenness of the stand.
