ONE HUNDRED THIRTY-TWO BLUE GRASS STRIPPERS READY TO BEGIN WORK

The largest battery of blue grass strippers ever assembled at one place in Nebraska, are ready to begin the harvest of Holt county's excellent crop of blue grass seed.

The blue grass seed obtained in Holt county is recognized throughout the United States as being superior to any to be obtained and for that reason the seed companies are anxious to harvest the seed at the opportune moment as the seed must be taken when it arrives at a certain stage of maturity; as the crop develops practically at the same time in every field concerted action must be had to get the seed at its best.

There are four companies in O'Neill with large batteries of machines ready to begin gathering next Monday. Some may start Saturday.

This is becoming a valuable industry for Holt county and should be encouraged by the farmers throughout the county.

During the intervening years Mr. Liddy enjoyed recounting the many thrilling experiences that came to him during his younger days.

Mr. Liddy came to Holt County more than fifty-seven years ago and homesteaded the farm on Eagle Creek where the celebration was held last Sunday. The old homestead has been occupied by some member of the family continuously since that time.
