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MRS. CLARENCE E. SHAW

Elsie M. Shaw, wife of Clarence E. Shaw, passed away in a Norfolk hospital on Sunday morning, June 15th. Peritonitis was given as the cause of her death.

Elsie was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Pribil, Jr., who reside about six miles south of O'Neill; she was born June 5th, 1909, at the family home where she continued to make her home until her marriage to Clarence E. Shaw on November 26, 1929, at O'Neill; since her marriage she has resided with her husband on a farm about ten or twelve miles southwest of O'Neill.

Elsie was always a studious girl; she attended St. Mary's Academy in O'Neill and was among those who were rated as the best in her grades.

She was the mother of a son born to her on Monday, June 9th; the following day it was thought best to remove her to the hospital for treatment; she passed away the following Sunday morning.

The remains were brought to the Biglin mortuary, Sunday afternoon.

Funeral services were held from St. Patrick's church Tuesday morning at nine o'clock, conducted by Rev. Monsignor M. F. Cassidy; burial was in Calvary cemetery.

The deceased leaves her husband, little son, her father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Pribil, Jr., and a host of relatives and friends who were shocked and deeply grieved to learn of her early death.

The floral tributes were many.

WILLIAM MATHER

William Mather passed away at his home three miles east of O'Neill about seven o'clock Wednesday morning following an illness that covered a period of several years; but only recently has he been considered seriously ill; several years ago his physical condition began to wane, but he has been able to be around and attend to business matters until the past few weeks.

The deceased was born near Oakley, Wisconsin, February 12, 1854; he made his home in Oakley until he was about twenty-five years of age, when he moved to Essex, Iowa, where he resided for two years, moving then to Greenwood, Nebraska in 1882 where on September 4, 1884 he was united in marriage to Miss Julia Sutton, to which union four children were born; the family resided in Greenwood, Nebraska, until the spring of 1894 when they moved to Seward county, Nebraska; they emigrated to O'Neill in 1903, and purchased the half section of land three miles east of O'Neill which has since been their home.

During his younger days Mr. Mather was an active business farmer; he was an admirer of fine stock and specialized in purebreds.

The deceased leaves a wife and two children, Clyde Mather, of Plainview, Nebraska and Mrs. Hazel Wolf who resides on the home place. Two children, Edith and Harry, died in infancy.

The funeral services will be held from the Methodist church in O'Neill Friday afternoon at 2:30, conducted by Rev. O. A. Fortune; burial will be in Prospect Hill cemetery.
