Based on last year's accident average we severely injure in Nebraska 19 people every day but during the last two weeks this average has shot up to 27 people a day.

No deaths have occurred in agricultural pursuits this time and the num-

ber of injuries is exceptionally low. Industrial and home accidents show no increase.

Though there has been but slight increase in the actual number of motor wrecks, the number injured almost doubled. A third of all motor vehicle accidents were collisions, the most of which were at highway and road intersections. While opinions of drivers and observers vary regarding actual happenings at most collisions the two apparent outstanding causes of such accidents are excessive speed and violation of highway markers.

Aviation accidents are increasing. Gunshot accidents and drownings are rapidly climbing.
