

ALTA YELLOW IS USED IN DEWEY

Constitutes 67 Per Cent of County's Corn Acreage

Alta yellow dent will be planted on 32 per cent of the land devoted to corn in Dewey county and the Alta, Fuller and Rustler varieties will constitute 67 per cent of the county's corn acreage.

Alta corn was introduced into Dewey county in 1924, when 10 bushels were brought in and distributed to 4-H club members.

Developed at the Highmore station as a variety, especially adapted for the two northern tiers of counties in South Dakota, Alta has consistently won first place in Dewey county corn contests and has made good with most of the critical farmers.

Fuller's yellow dent has also shown up well in corn contests and is being grown more generally this year than ever before.

"Rustler" is the name given to several local strains of white dent, formerly the most popular variety in the county and thought to be the only one which would mature safely.

NEBRASKA BUYS ANOTHER LAKE

Small Body of Water Near Spalding to Be Made Fishing Resort

Lincoln, Neb. — (UP) — Pibel Lake, a 35-acre body of water contained within a 65-acre tract in Greeley county, was purchased, Thursday by the game, forestation and parks commission for \$6,500.

The place will be made into a public fishing ground and a large hotel building on the edge of the lake probably will be leased to a concessionaire. The commission met again Thursday to consider the possible purchase of other tracts offered to the state as public recreation places.

Pibel lake lies about five miles northwest of Spalding, James Gilroy, Greeley county farmer, was its owner. A group of Missouri river fishermen was heard by the commission with the request that something be done about allowing the fishermen to continue the taking fish by seine and net in the river. Members of the commission made no decision.

A delegation from the community club at Memphis promised the commission aid in developing the recreation grounds recently purchased near there. The men said that work will begin soon on graveling the town's street leading to the artificial lake which has been developed.
