A cloud of dust prevented the driver from seeing a truck that was going the same way that the car was going; the salesmen were too close to stop and when they tried to go around the truck, they hit the loose gravel which caused the wreck; the men were somewhat cut and bruised but seemingly not seriously injured.

The machine does the work in fine shape. The Berger Brothers have a field of 120 acres that were sown by the middle of April; the writer saw the field while it was in bloom a few weeks ago and we can truthfully say that it was a beautiful sight. The yield is thought to be from seven to ten bushels per acre. Judge Dickson is cutting his flax at this time, on his farm four miles north of O'Neill. The flax seems to be of good quality and will, perhaps, make about the same amount per acre as the Berger Brothers field. There are several other fields of flax in this vicinity but we do not have any information regarding them.

A card written last Sunday from the bedside of Willis Barker, who is very ill in an Omaha hospital, states that he is slowly sinking and the end depends entirely upon the amount of vitality that he has stored away.
